NEWSY LETTER.

DEAR SIRS.—Thinking that it might be interesting to the many readers of the ACADIAN to know what is going on in this little country of ours, and as I am most of the time travelling, I thought I would write a few lines, which if you think will be interesting you may publish.

The cherry-trees at Bear River, Round Hill and Weymouth are just now loaded with fruit, tempting to the eye and taste. Four excursions leave Yarmouth this week for the above mentioned places. Miller & Crosby, at Carleton, have bonded their gold mine for one month, and if the parties can raise the money in that time it will be sold for \$5,000. The gold mine at Kempville is again running. Many are prospecting in different part of Kempt and Carleton, and have struck some good leads. A fine specimen of coal has lately been found at Plimpton, Digby County. Small fish are scarce on the St. Mary's Bay, and the fishermen at Port Maitland have taken up their traps—Crops in Yarmouth County look well. There will be a good crop of hay, but at Metagan on St. Mary's Bay there has been no rain for six weeks, and the fields in many places look as if a fire had run over them. There has been heavy frost on the line of the W. C. Railway, which has destroyed an immense amount of property; also below Digby town, near the head of St. Mary's Bay.

The Roman Catholics at Metagan are building a fine cathedral which is to cost \$5,000. Game will be plentiful this fall as I saw three flocks of partridges, any amount of rabbits, and had an awful time to pull the porcupine quills out of my dog's nose on my way from Ohio to Kempville. Business appears to be quite brisk in Yarmouth, and money seems to be more plentiful than anywhere I have travelled this season; and the people are more Americanized and are more tasteful about their dwellings; and some of the loveliest thorn hedges in the Province are to be seen at Milton and at Yarmouth town. Diptheria is raging near Marshalltown and has carried off quite a number of children. There are several gangs of men at work at the Niagara & Atlantic railway, and in some places it looks as if they meant business.

The crops all around the north shore look well, also about Bridgewater, Springfield and New Germany; but I noticed that in many places in our valley that the apples are dropping off the trees, no doubt or account of the very dry weather, which has such an effect on the wells at Bridgetown that they are nearly all dry; and many people to quench their raging thirst do really mix their drinks with ale or bad rum, I suppose to save the water, as you know they would not if water was not scarce.
