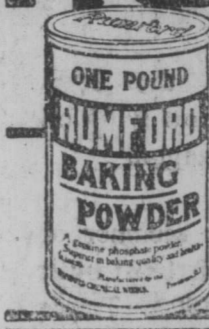

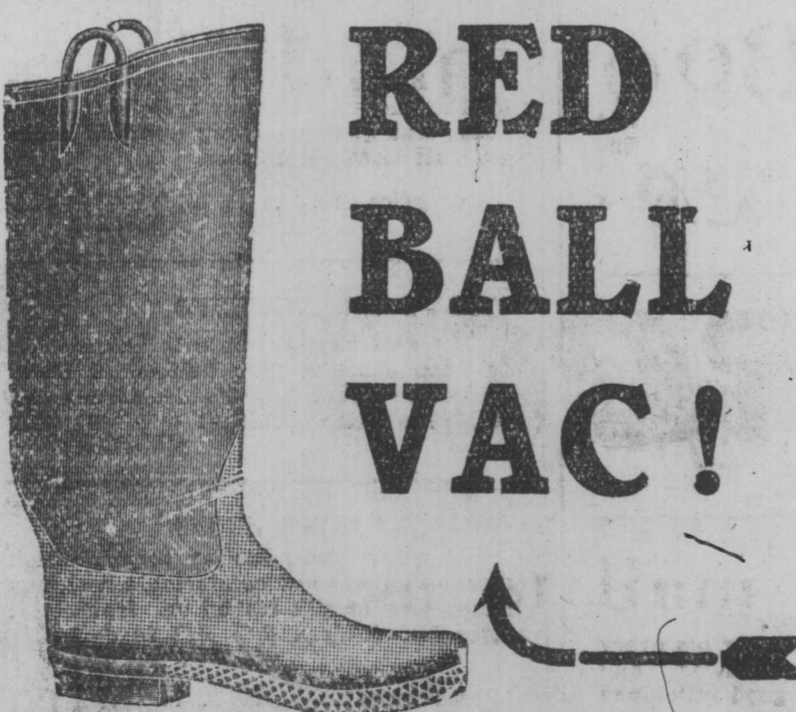
Methodist Conference Notes

The Conference got down to work yesterday morning at the usual hour.
The Educational Deputation
A deputation consisting of ten of our most respected citizens, representing the five Protestant Denominations, appeared at the Conference in time, the order of the day being to hear them at ten o'clock.
Messrs. J. W. Withers, Brain Dunfield and J. J. McKay were invited to a place on the platform and in turn addressed the Conference. Mr. J. W. Withers spoke as an Anglican. He drew a splendid picture of St. John's when the spirit of unity would drive out the narrower idea of sectarian exclusiveness. Beautiful schools, splendidly equipped, with decorated walls. He referred to our Roman Catholic contemporaries who in ten years were reported to have spent \$200,000 on education.
Mr. Brian Dunfield followed. He also had caught the vision of Mr. Withers. He spoke of the \$700,000 raised or promised within the last few months. He hoped to see things done in a few years that were impossible a few years ago. He said, "We have been grappling with these problems for the last six months." He paid a tribute to the Methodist College building as the best Protestant College in St. John's, but while recognizing the standard set up by experts at 100 per cent. of certain essentials, the College only registered 37 per cent. There were 1200 schoolable children in St. John's who don't go to school, and 20 per cent. of these could not go if they wanted, owing to lack of accommodation.
Mr. J. J. MacKay next addressed the Conference and also spoke some good, practical words. He didn't condemn the churches, but he thought the work of controlling education had become too large for the churches. Mr. MacKay spoke for the Presbyterians, who were dependent on other religious bodies for their education. After the delegation a number of ministers and laymen spoke to the question.
Mr. Arthur Mews, C.M.G., moved a resolution of appreciation of the work they were doing and the Conference pledged its hearty co-operation in bringing about a remedy for the state of things as they exist, particularly in St. John's. It was the common concession that the delegation was one of the most important that has been before the Conference.
College Board of Governors and the Memorialists.
The question of going or not going on with the building of a residence for outport pupils was the spirit of a memorial. The memorialists agreed that owing to other claims and the urgent needs of the city with its army of schoolable children unprovided for, that the College Home might hang in a balance for another year. Strong arguments were used on both sides, but the resolution to put off the work for another year was lost.
The Late Rev. E. Pollett Ward
A time of solemn review took place and the Conference paid a good many tributes to the work of the late Edwin Pollett Ward. A more devoted and consecrated minister never laboured within the bound of this Conference. The brethren paid their tributes of love and high esteem to their fellow
