WIN PARMERS ARE KICKING

Packers Paying Great Deal Less Than Before Though Costs Are Still High

Regina, Dec. 7.— Charging packing houses with depressing meat prices. H. E. Jones, member of Tisdale and L. Stirling, Cypress, Monday described the deplorable condition of farmers to the action of packing houses.

When interviewed, Mr. Stirling said farmers are being paid from five to seven cents a pound for two and three-year-old steers, while the price in the Fall of 1919 was between 10 and 12 cents for animals of a like age and quality. Hogs are bringing the farmers about 13 cents a pound as compared to 29 cents a pound in

1919, he declared. "People are wondering why the farmers are complaining," said Mr. Stirling, "The reason is easy to discover. They are receiving from five to seven cents, a pound for their beef; it costs the packers around nine cents a pound dressed and yet beef is retailing at prices ranging up to 40 cents a pound.

"Mnay farmers are being driven to the wall; they are short of money and are forced to send their stock to market to raise money although they know that the stock should really be kept and fattened. But what can they do?

"It must be admitted that many farmers are themselves to blame. Some of them are in a position to keep their cattle and feed them, and instead of doing it they dump them on the market with the result that prices tumble. The only solution to the problem is to form a farmers' organization to combat the action of the packers," he said.

Mr. Jones supported the sentiments expressed by Mr. Stirling and in addition cited the Winnipeg stock market. 'From what I know of conditions there, the packers each arrange the day on which they will buy their stock. The result is that one representative of one particular firm is the sole bidder for the stock. There is no competition with the result that the packing houses secure the stock at their own price.

"This, to my mind, is the state of affairs that is responsible for the present strained position of many farmers in Saskatchewan. The only cure I can see is that some organization be formed to beat the packers at their own game."

STAMP SELLER NOTIFIED HE IS NO LONGER NEEDED

The Dominion Government has abolished the system of stamp vending that has been in vogue for many years. Hereafter the stamp vendors are to be members of the post office staffs. W. McAneran, stamp vendor, has been in chargein Brandon for nine years. On December 2nd, Mr. McAneran was notified that after January 2nd his services would no longer be required.
