Pigeon racing used to be confined to Belgium, but during the last thirty years has increased produciously in the British Isles, though it is still essontially a Nosah of England sport.

Three years ago the race which was held between Names and Lancashire showed that the winning bird could cover a distance of 177 miles at a rate of 1,600 yards a minute. The winner of the Marennes race flew 517 miles at the rate of 1,467 yards a minute.

The Bishop of Salisbury, England, after he had consecrated a new churchyard, said it was the hungering to be sure that those who had passed away still lived which encouraged people in these days to look more and more deeply into the mysterious and dangerous, psychological theory called spiritualism, and led people to attend seances.

He, for one, was prepared to encourage scientific investigation into the borderland between the seen and the unseen, because God had given them their reason to find out things. If there was something to find out, let them try to find it.

"But," added Dr. Donaldson, "let us try to find it out merely as a matter of knowledge. In God's name, I charge you, do not expect to get in touch with, or to know, loved ones through these channels. Don't look for it. Don't attempt it.

"God has given you enough to comfort you in your sorrow. Follow His teaching. To go beyond that is to go into danger, and to tread forbidden ground which may lead you into trouble.

"I know Christian people who have found great joy in such things, but they have also found great dangers, and have had to choose between the Christian faith and spiritualism. I ask you not to begin to make these investigations unless you make them in connection with scientific societies."
