

ENGINEER IS TO EXPLAIN.

Hydro-Electric Representative in the City To-night.

Difficulty Over James Street Work Probably Settled.

Quarantine on the House Where Smallpox Existed Raised.

A special meeting of the Board of Works has been called for this evening when Chief Engineer Sothman, of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, will be present and explain to the aldermen the various estimates on underground work and other parts of the proposed municipal system.

The difficulty over the width of the devil strip on James street, between King and Main streets, where the Railway Board ordered the city and company to make improvements, has been amicably adjusted.

Dr. Roberts, Medical Health Officer, this morning raised the quarantine on 77 Merrick street, the house where Eva Hutchinson, a thirteen-year-old girl, was detained as a smallpox patient.

No adjustment of the insurance on the famous sandusker has been reached yet, although one of the company's officials was expected here today.

Complaints have been made that gravel is still being taken from near the base of the High Level bridge, although the Board of Works ordered this was to be stopped.

Engineer Heddle has handed over to the city engineer his report on the repairs made to the tracks by the Street Railway Company and Mr. Barrow says the report is very favorable to the company as also is the one prepared by Foreman Towers.

The city engineer said this morning that he was going to charge the Hamilton Street Railway Company for the amount of water it used in the concrete construction on King street east. It does not amount to very much, but then Mr. Barrow thinks the company should settle, as he says it promised to pay for the water used in this work.

The City Council last night decided to invite Lieut. Governor Mortimer Clark, who is going to Stony Creek battlefield on October 22, when the celebration of the burning of the mortgage debt will take place, to come to Hamilton.
