The second night of "The Sleeping Beauty" performance was quite as successful as the first, there being a crowded audience which thoroughly enjoyed the performance. At the close those taking part were entertained at supper by the I.O.D.E. and a dance wound up the evening.

Welland will have a tax rate of 33 mills this year, an increase of four mills over last year. The city council has also decided to adopt the daylight saving scheme to go into effect April 30. Both these measures were the occasion of long debates, the daylight-saving being vigorously opposed by some Councillors.

The creditors of the Toronto World have appointed three inspectors to look after their interests, Ward Wright, Mr. Osler, of the firm of Blake, Lash and Cassels, and Frank Mantion, the latter a trade creditor. Upon the suggestion of Mr. Clarkson, the two first mentioned inspectors were appointed on the grounds that they represented claims of \$290,000 and \$98,000, or a total of \$388,000.

A man who got drunk and beat his wife was fined \$11 in police court today. He said he had got four drinks in Thorold from a man whom he had helped to move a stove. "Another man and I went to Thorold to help the man who was a friend of ours and that's the whole truth," he declared. As the man had been arrested on Woodland Avenue, the Magistrate expressed the opinion that it was more likely in that region that he had got the dooze.

CUDAHY MANAGER HELD IN NEW YORK FOR PROFITEERING

NEW YORK, April 22.—The fourth arrest in a few days of Brooklyn managers of big packing houses for alleged profiteering came today when Oliver H. Saunders, manager of the Cudahy Packing Company, was taken into custody charged with selling from hinds and ribs of beef at excessive prices.

It was alleged he sold at 34 cents a pound meat similar to that which a few days before he had sold at 29 cents. He pleaded not guilty and was held in \$2,500 bail for examination, May 5th.





Rough Look In Vicinity

Defence Spring Surprised Buffalo Men Did the Killing the Trial.

BUFFALO, April 22.—"I had on my mind and my heart." That was why Tony George, laborer, could not rest until he had delivered to the proper persons after four years of silence—the story he told yesterday afternoon of the witness stand, the story that made John Edward Teiper from the electric chair.

Tells of Meeting Negroes In broken English, earnestly and straightforwardly, this surprise witness for the defense told of meeting in the Orchard Park road on the afternoon of the Teiper tragedy two negroes who looked and acted suspiciously. One of these he described as "big and large."

The most striking thing about the man's testimony, corroborating what would seem, the defendant's story about the "burly nigger" who committed the murders, he is charged with, is the fact that it was brought voluntarily to the defense only within the past month. And brought because his man's conscience pricked him much, he said, that he got up out of bed one night to write on a piece of paper the gist of his story.

He had wanted four years ago to tell of seeing two negroes, he said, but did not know how to get information to the authorities. Besides Tony said, pointing to the defendant, who sat a few feet away from the witness stand, "all the people say he did it," and he thought his story of no consequence for the season.

Even after his conscience had finally forced him to action nineteen days ago, he told the jury he knew of no other way of making his information public except by paying to have it inserted in a newspaper.

Writing the gist of his story on a scrap of paper, he slipped it in the keyhole of a newspaper office, then starting the information on the way to Roscoe R. Mitchell, association counsel for the defense, who drew
