A Reminder of the 1898 Contract

We notice that the City Council has been considering the standing of those who have built houses near the Battery, that the Council is in receipt of a communication from Mr. Massey of the R. N. Co. in which the Company states that the land is their property under lease from the Government, and that they have given no titles to those who have built on the land in question. The Solicitor of the Council gives his opinion that the settlers there are mere squatters.

It may interest our readers to learn that in one of the drafts of the 1898 Contract this land was excluded from the purview of the contract, as was the old track from Harbor Grace to Carbonear.

For some reason the clause containing the exclusion of this waterside land was dropped.

The clause excluding the old Carbonear track was retained, but not that which referred to the land in question.

The reason is not apparent.

As the contract provided for a West End terminus, the transfer of this land to Mr. Reid was unnecessary. Again, during the past 12 years, i.e., since the contract came into being, this land has not been used for the purpose of operating the railway.

Why, then, was the clause excluding it from the conveyance of the railroad dropped?
