### A Reminder of the 1898 Contract

We notice that the City Council has been considering the standing of those who have built houses near the Battery, that the Council is in receipt of a communication from Mr. Massey of the R. N. Co. in which the Company states that the land is their property under lease from the Government, and that they have given no titles to those who have built on the land in question. The Solicitor of the Council gives his opinion that the settlers there are mere squatters.

It may interest our readers to learn that in one of the drafts of the 1898 Contract this land was excluded from the purview of the contract, as was the old track from Harbor Grace to Carbonara.

For some reason the clause containing the exclusion of this waterside land was dropped.

The clause excluding the old Carbonara track was retained, but not that which referred to the land in question.

The reason is not apparent. As the contract provided for a West End terminus, the transfer of this land to Mr. Reid was unnecessary. Again, during the past 12 years, i.e., since the contract came into being, this land has not been used for the purpose of operating the railway.

Why, then, was the clause excluding it from the conveyance of the railroad dropped?

### Canadian Trade Agreements.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 10.

The details of the trade agreements concluded with Belgium, the Netherlands and Italy, were announced by the Finance Department this morning. As already foreshadowed, the Canadian intermediate tariff rates granted to France and extended to Belgium and the Netherlands in return for the friendly attitude which these countries have always maintained towards Canada, and in view of the fact that they are both low tariff countries and are entitled to equal treatment with France. In a few cases where the latter country gets under the Franco-Canadian agreement lower than intermediate rates, equally lower rates cannot be given to the Netherlands and Belgium since this would require legislation by Parliament. These countries, however, are not particularly interested in the articles mentioned in the special schedule of the French Treaty.

Since January £21,674,262 of British capital has been invested in Canada.

**GROCERS LEAVE HERE.**—By the Florizel to-day Messrs. Bartlett, Wilson and Hickey left here for Newark, N.J., where they will locate in future. All these are grocers and they will look for situations in their line there.

**PRICE OF LOBSTERS.**—Lobsters are now quoted at \$14 per case in the market and there is a ready sale for them at this figure. This is \$1 more than that given for them this time last year.

**WHALES PLENTIFUL.**—The pilots say that for the past few days whales have been very plentiful in the neighborhood of Cape Spear and also up around Petty Hr. and Bay Bulls. If a whaling ship was about she would reap a pretty good harvest.

**PREPARING FOR MATCHES.**—The Football League to-day have a number of men at work in St. George's Field cutting the grass and rolling the ground for the football matches. This promises to be an interesting football season, and the contests will be keen as the competing clubs are well matched and have had plenty of practice.

### Brigades Parade.

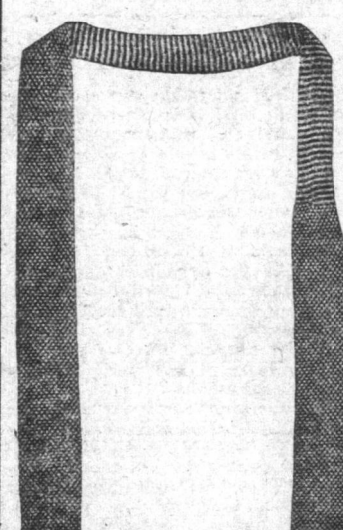
The Methodist Guards meet at their armoury at 10 o'clock sharp to-morrow to parade to Gower St. Church. All the ladies must master out.

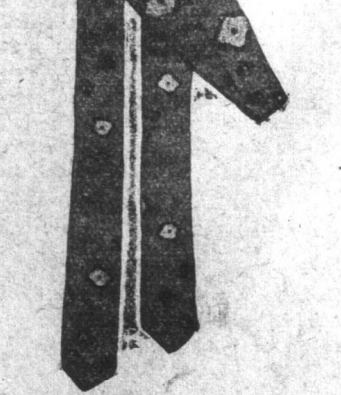
