

Hr. Grace Notes.

A baby boy was born to Mr. and Mrs. John D. Webber, on Wednesday last, 22nd inst.

Mr. John Andrews, an old resident of Water Street West, died last evening after a long illness. He leaves one son and one daughter to mourn their loss.

At the annual meeting of the Harbour Grace Fire Brigade, held on Monday last, it was decided to build a new race boat for our annual Regatta. It was also decided to hold during Easter week an old-time Firemen's Ball, which cannot be other than a great success.

A little sheep dog owned by a lady who lately moved to this town from the Goulds, was missing for some days, and it was feared that he was lost, but a word came from the Goulds last week that the dog had arrived there, a distance of 18 miles from here. The strange part of the story is that the animal had never been over the road, but by train. He evidently was not fond of town life, and with genuine wisdom preferred his country home.

Another of our old citizens passed away early on Friday morning, Mr. Kennedy Thomey, at the advanced age of 80 years. Mr. Thomey was born at Bristol's Hope and one of a family of 14 children, only two now remaining. Mrs. Connolly, still living in Bristol's Hope, and Mr. Denis Thomey, of St. John's. Mr. Thomey carried on the fishery business on Long Island, Labrador, for a number of years, but latterly he stayed home and gave his attention to his land at his native village. He has been a helpless invalid for the past 18 months, and resided with his son, Mr. Michael Thomey. Another son, Samuel J., is also here, agent for the Singer Sewing Co., these with one daughter, Mrs. (Capt.) W. H. Ellis, of Plymouth, England, are the only surviving members of his family. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended by our townspeople generally as well as some friends from Bristol's Hope and Carbonear. His brother Denis, of St. John's, was also here to attend the funeral.

Saturday was another busy day at the Court House. The Court opened at 11 o'clock. The first case on the docket was a restaurant keeper charged by Head Const. Sheppard with a breach of the 15th Section of the Temperance Act. He pleaded not guilty, and one witness was called, who swore that on several occasions lately he had purchased rum at defendant's house. Conviction followed and a fine of \$100 with an alternative of 10 weeks in prison was imposed. Another resident charged with a similar offence was called to the bar and when the charge was read out to him he pleaded guilty, and it being the third offence the sentence of the Court was \$150 and costs or four months. This makes a total of nine convictions for the same offence since hostilities commenced about three weeks ago; the total amount of the fines imposed being in the neighbourhood of \$930.00, costs to be added in each case.

Mr. Selby Noseworthy, of Bryant's Cove, had four men belonging to that

settlement in Court on the charge of trespass and cutting trees in his grove. All admitted the charge partly but one, and he admitted passing through, but only with his gun, parting hunting on the 22nd inst. "Close season," said Head Sheppard, and the man although escaping a fine for trespass, was fined \$5.00 for parting hunting in close season. The others were fined \$5.00 each for trespassing and wood-cutting.
