GERARD APPEALS FOR GERMAN POOR.

NEW YORK, To-day. In endorsing the thanksgiving appeal for funds to relieve distress among the war sufferers of Germany issued in this city to-day by James W. Gerard, U. S. Ambassador to Germany, a statement sent out by the Associated Press declares the great need of relief work among the poor of the Teutonic Empire. Gerard points out that Americans seem more ready than other nations than to Germany and concludes, "If I am able to go back to Germany bringing a substantial sum of money raised by this committee, I don't know anything better to aid the relations between this country and Germany. When the Germans see the funds that have been raised by a committee so distinctly American as this is, it cannot but make the most excellent impression upon people there."


OTTAWA, To-day. "Pearson's Magazine" published in New York has been excluded from Canadian mails and prohibited from circulation in Canada. This action was taken under the "War Measures Act" for publication of articles containing an Order-in-Council passed in June, 1915. The editor of the paper is Frank Harris, a renegade Englishman who is a son-in-law of Kipling, one of the foremost apostles of German "Kultur." Persons having a copy of the publication in their possession are liable to a fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment not to exceed five years. The paper has no connection with the English Magazine of the same name.

NEW PREMIER OF AUSTRIA.

LONDON, To-day. The Vienna evening newspapers announce that Dr. Von Koerber, former Austrian Prime Minister, has been appointed Premier to succeed Karl Sturgkh, says a Reuter despatch from Amsterdam. He has undertaken the formation of a new cabinet.

WAR SUMMARY.

LONDON, To-day. The Rumanians, caught in the grip of the two invading forces of the Central Powers, are still struggling desperately to ward off the incessant attacks of Field-Marshal Von Mackensen and General Von Falkenhayn. Advancing northward in Dobruja Von Mackensen's troops have reached a line running from Hirsova on the Danube to Casapeuk on the Black Sea coast, from forty to sixty miles from where they crossed the Constantza-Tchernavoda railway line. The capture of Hirsova would give to the Teutonic Allies advantage in having little marshy ground to traverse should they attempt to make a crossing of the river here into old Roumania, as the low-lying ground virtually disappears for some distance around Hirsova. General Von Falkenhayn continues to progress in the direction of Campulung south of Praelal on the Transylvanian front. Bucharest admits the retreat of the Rumanian forces in the Juhl Valley which is situated in the Vulcan Pass region. The Russo-Rumanian forces in the north have repulsed the Austro-German attacks while in the Uzul Valley the Rumanians continue to advance in the region of Okna and have occupied the height and village. Inclement weather is hampering the operations on the Somme and on the western front. Only bombardments have taken place in these regions. Another attempt by the Germans at an attack west of the village of Dommarin in the Verdun region was checked by the French curtain of fire. The Germans are still heavily bombarding all the newly won positions of the French in this region. On the eastern front in Russia there has been little fighting except in the region of the River northwest of Pinsk, near Goldschichta. The Germans attacked and forced the Russians to retire to the eastern bank of the Sharna. In an engagement in the English Channel between British and German torpedo boat destroyers, two German destroyers were sunk, according to London, while the British lost an empty transport. In addition to a British torpedo destroyer missing, another was run aground after it had been disabled by a torpedo.

PITY IT WAS ONLY THE ENGINEER

PARIS, To-day. A bomb dropped by an aviator of the Entente Allies has killed the Engineer driving the train of Emperor William of Germany, according to information received at Zurich, Switzerland.

CAMPULUNG TAKEN BY GERMANS.

LONDON, To-day. The German troops on the Transylvanian front have reached Campulung, 20 miles within the Rumanian border says a Petrograd despatch. Campulung lies about 33 miles southwest of the Praelal Pass, which recently was forced by the German troops under command of Von Falkenhayn. The city lies 80 miles northwest of Bucharest the Rumanian capital.

HIRSOVA ALSO TAKEN.

SOFIA, To-day. The Teutonic Allies in Dobruja under command of Von Mackensen have occupied Hirsova on the Danube River, about forty miles north of the Tchernavoda-Constantza line, says a Bulgarian war office statement to-day. There is no great activity on other Bulgarian fronts.

MORE SUBMARINE DOINGS.

LONDON, To-day. The Norwegian steamer Bygde has been sunk off Christiania and her crew landed. The British trawler Fuchsig has been sunk and crew imprisoned in Germany. The Norwegian steamer Leyland is also sunk.

BRITAIN'S HUGE DREADNOUGHTS.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., To-day. The Journal, in a despatch from London to-day says the British Admiralty officials are delighted with the marvelous work that has been done in the British dockyards in building the new Dreadnoughts. Wonderful results which have not up to this been made public have been accomplished in this direction. Twelve new battleships of the super-Dreadnought type are now practically ready for sea. Four of these are the four largest and most powerful weapons of defence that have ever been placed in the water. They are 850 feet long with a speed of over thirty knots and are armed with twelve 15-inch guns. No such armament as this has ever before been contemplated in the history of naval architecture, and it is considered that ships of this type are capable of winning any sea fight in which they may be engaged.

WILLIAM'S MOVEMENTS.

PARIS, To-day. Emperor William recently was reported to be at Bapaume on the Somme front, personally overseeing the preliminaries for a counter offensive, for which the German troops there were said to have received strong reinforcements. On Monday last the Emperor was in Berlin on a brief visit, and conferred with the Imperial Chancellor and visited the Palace at Potsdam. His movements since then have not been reported.



THE THOUGHTS

THE NEW P. M. G.

During this year the "Fourth Estate" has had more honours and preferences thrust upon it than for many years past. Beginning with Hon. Mr. McGrath, who received a double honour in being placed in one of the highest positions in the Colony as President of the Legislative Council, as well as receiving his title as Doctor of the next office was the Telegram whose calm was disturbed by the election of Dr. Lloyd to the leadership of the Opposition in the House and of the Liberal-Union Party. And now the Daily News, from which it is difficult to dissociate Mr. Robinson's name, has to take its turn, and its editor leaves the freedom of speech and action of journalism for the dull and routine of the Postal Service. If "writing makes an exact man," Mr. Robinson's years in the editorial chair have not unfitted him for the position of Postmaster General. As I have said before, the Postal Service should be run as a machine, well-oiled, regular and exact, with the engineer in charge one of original turn, and quick to see opportunities and grasp them for the advantage of the Service. Though perhaps with conservative tendencies, I hope Mr. Robinson will look towards the day when we shall have a one cent postage rate for the Island, and cent-a-word telegrams. I am glad to think that this will frown down upon any restrictions being put on the dissemination of newspapers and other literature through the mails, but will rather encourage anything of the nature which will encourage reading and the acquisition of knowledge.

FOOD PRICES.

I notice that my note of warning of food prices was taken up with more prominence by some newspapers. Few men who think dispute the principle that excessive profits, especially in war time, are cruel and unpatriotic. Patriotism includes a regard and consideration for fellow-countrymen. Excessive and unnecessary profits therefore brand those demanding them as unpatriotic and distasteful—a hard saying, but a true one. The latest increase, that 50 per cent increase on freights by the Red Cross Line, is somewhat high. The increase of freight rates by the Stephano Florizal since the war, has risen from one hundred per cent to the hundred per cent. One of the reasons given for this was the extra expense, including war risk insurance. But it has been said lately that
