"Stone of Destiny." JACOB'S PILLOW USED IN CORONA-TION OF ALL RRITISH KINGS.

Dublin, Nov. 6 .- Among many aniques now in England which Irishman say should be restored to Ireland by virtue of her new status, is the 'Stone of Destiny" in Westminster Abbey, upon which every English king Edward I. was crowned. While since Edward I. was crowned. While Irish antiquarians are not unanimous point, one school holds that this stone is the original "Lia Fail" from the hill of Tara, the ancient seat

of the Irish kings. According to one English tradition the stone was carried to Ireland from Bethel as "Jacob's Pillow," upon which Jacob slept when he dreamed. In Ireland it became the pillow of St. Columba at Iono, was removed to Scone, Scotland, by Kenneth II. in the ninth century, and then to Westminster by

Edward I. Some antiquarians dispute this however, alleging that the stone was brought to Ireland by Tuathe do Denann and his colony from Germany, and subsequently placed upon the hill of Tara. The stone was supposed to have supernatural powers, making a creaking noise when a legitimate king was being crowned, but maintaining a stony silence when a usurper sat up-

The Irish high kings who sat upon during the Tuathe de Denann colony, came to Ireland about 1896 B.C.; and the stone, according to this legend, remained till the fifth century A.D., and when Fergus Macero, then the high king left Tara on a conquering expedition he bore the stone away to Scone for his coronation Edward is said to have taken it away in the thirteenth century. HAS NOT RECOVERED FROM LAST CONFLAGRATION.

Smyrna burned and the world was

startled. Constantinople is partly burnedbut the world has forgotten about it. 'Traces of the fires that swept Baltimore and Chicago have been obliterated; but not so with disastrous blazes that charred whole sections of the Turkish city which just now is very much a centre of world attention," says a bulletin from the Washington headquarters of the National Geographic Society, based on a communication from Salita Solane.

"The devastating fires that have been working toward the destruction of Constantinople caused the city to be built anew every 50 years, until a law was passed prohibiting the construction of wooden houses on the site of burned ones; in fact, it was provided that no houses at all should be built until the city governmen planned new streets.

"Nothing has been done about

planning, however, and the result is that one-fourth of Stamboul-more than 22,000 houses, burned during the past 12 years-still lies in ashes. Scutari, too, has vast ruined sections So has Peru, on a much smaller scale, When a fire starts in Stamboul it nearly always assumes frightful proportions. In the fire of 1908, 1500 buildings were destroyed; in that of 1911, 2463 houses; the following day an entire Jewish quarter burned; in 1912 an immense area between Sancta Sophia and the Marmora was consumed. The fire of June, 1918, burned 8000 buildings, clearing a space from the Golden Hern through the centre of the city. These fires are enormously destructive because of the narrow streets, wooden houses and volunteer firemen who go to answer


