**TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.**

**PRINCE LEAVES FOR CANADA IN AUGUST.**  
 SOUTHAMPTON, July 9. It is announced that the Prince of Wales will sail for Canada with four or five friends, on August 25th and will return to England about the beginning of October. No elaborate arrangements are being made for the trip, and the Prince at his own request will travel as an ordinary first class passenger.

**A WAVE FOR DAVIS.**  
 NEW YORK, July 9. Welling up through all the bitterness of the days and nights that have gone, a mighty formless roaring about like a great sigh of relief blasted its way through the dingy trappings of Madison Square Garden to-day to tell that a miracle had happened, and that a decision had been reached, and that John R. Davis, of West Virginia, had been nominated by acclamation to 1924. At last against all the bitter carry the Democratic standard for cross currents of the sweeter days and nights that lay behind, the deadlocked National Democratic Convention had broken through the Jones jam of conflicting opinion. Almost without realizing what it had done, it hurled itself as one man into the rush that brought Davis' votes flooding faster than clerks could write the record.

**PIRACY ON RUM ROW.**  
 HALIFAX, July 9. An amazing tale of piracy among the liquor ships on the Jersey Coast, "rum row," involving the theft of a million dollars worth of liquor and three thousand dollars in cash, has been related by members of the crew of the French steamer Mulhouse which arrived here yesterday. It is understood there will be an investigation locally held by the French Consul General to decide whether or not the piracy tale is bona fide. According to the story the Mulhouse was boarded some days ago by thirty "highjackers," who drove the crew below decks and after manacled the officers kept them prisoners for ten days while they unloaded thirty-five thousand cases of liquors into small boats. The story was told that the prisoners were half starved, and that those of them who agreed to help in discharging the cargo for which they would be paid by the pirates were afterwards robbed of their earnings at the point of guns. Another rum runner in port to-day reported that in the attack on the Mulhouse one of the pirates was shot and killed. Those on the latter steamer, however, refuse to give any details.

**BRAZIL REBELS IN HOPELESS POSITION.**  
 BUENOS AIRES, July 10. Sao Paulo rebels were still holding their positions in Luz barracks this morning, according to advices from Rio de Janeiro quoting the official account. The account added the assertion that rebels would be unable to hold much longer owing to desertions and exhaustion and the fact that they are surrounded and without possibility of receiving reinforcements.

**CANADIAN FISHERY THE LEGISLATION.**  
 OTTAWA, July 10. A bill to amend Fisheries Act 1914 was given a third reading in the House last night, it reduces the license fees on canneries in British Columbia following recommendations made by the Duff Commission a first and second reading was given to a bill to regulate the manufacture of by products of fish canneries and to impose a tax of 25 cents ton on dry salted herring in British Columbia.

**INTERNATIONAL MERCANTILE MARINE.**

Director Bonner in Hospital Interview—No Dividend Resumption in Sight.

(Boston News Bureau.)

NEW YORK.—"From present indications I expect earnings of International Mercantile Marine for the year to be better than they were last year," said Harry Bronner, a director of the company, sailing for Europe.

"The company will safely earn its fixed charges and depreciation, both of which amount to a little more than \$7,000,000. The company will not, however, be able to resume dividends this year."

"I do not look for any big boom in business generally," Mr. Bronner continued, "because the country has caught up on its housing, plants, automobile and railroad programs. This has caused business to slow down. Slowing-down in business has caused cheap money, which is now idle and looking for a place for investment. This has caused a rising of security prices."
