ITS DEMERITS.

They are many notwithstanding the "microscope." They are nearly as numerous as the falsehoods employed by unscrupulous vendors to impose them on public credulity, I will endeavour to state them in plain terms. 1st. The method of communicating the power of the mainspring. It is defective because it will not allow the power to be uniformly transmitted. The fusee, or variable lever, the object of which is to equalize the power of the mainspring is not used in the American watch, consequently when it is wound up or the mainspring at its greatest or maximum tension, the force exerted on the wheelwork is greater than at any other time, and gradually diminishes as it runs, down or approaches its least tension.

It is an axiom, with which every school-boy is familiar, that like causes produce the same results when governed by like circumstances. Now the object of a watch is to measure time. The regular indication of time is the required result, but if the motive power or force is imparted unequally, which it must be in the absence of the fusee or any compensating medium irregularity of time must be the inevitable result. Nor is this all.

The Main Spring is More Liable to Break.

Unassociated with the fusee, the mainspring is more frequently broken entailing far more serious consequences than it otherwise could. For example, when the main spring breaks the teeth of the great wheel, the centre pinion, and third wheel pivot are broken in consequence. The reason is clear. Force is strong or weak in proportion to the distance it has to travel. In a watch without a fusee and chain, the force of winding is immediately and unevenly applied to the mainspring, hence its liability to break; then again the immediate connection of this force of breakage with the teeth of the great wheel, centre pinion, and the third wheel pivot, is certain to produce injury, expense, trouble, and rapid deterioration. These observations will apply to Swiss Watches, because the American Watch is an exact copy of them in these particulars, the only difference being that for a third of the price of the American Watch a good Swiss one can be obtained.

The absence of the fuse and chain, therefore, is to procure cheapness at the expense of principle; but in regard to the various qualities of Swiss Watches, as compared with those of American manufacture, I positively assert without fear of contradiction, the latter cannot approach the former for cheapness, the anext of workmanship.

SOFT BRASS.

The brass of which the American Watch is made, especially the cheaper class, is exceedingly soft;this means simply rapid wear. It retains the gilding but a short time; the oil soon corrodes, a glutinous and gritty substance forms, pivots are cut, and the watch very soon becomes a subject for Tenairs.

pairs.

A remarkable defect of the American Watch is the largeness and coarseness of the pivots. This greatly increases the friction and demands a stronger main-spring than would be required under more favourable circumstances. Overcoming a difficulty of this kind by increasing the power destroys the watch.

able circumstances. Overcoming a difficulty of this kind by increasing the power destroys the watch.

These are the most glaring faults of the American Watch and have been verified as such in my own experience as a practical watchmaker. Having manipulated every grade of them I can speak with confidence concerning their defects.

The American Watch is popular with Americans. Every day, this astounding popularity is paraded in redaubtable advertisements. During the past six years two things have served to make them popular in the States only—1st, a very high protective tariff excluding foreign competition—and 2nd, an enveterate hostility to everything English. In this connection I cannot for hear to repeat that the history of watchmaking ascribes to England, the highest possible position attainable. The names of Reid, Arnold, Carushaw, Adams, Harrison and Russell prove this. Now when it is considered that the highest reputation for manufacturing watches has been acquired in England, and that it is still being maintained and perpetuated, it may be very safely concluded that the people of the Dominion of Canada will cling limity to that which most deserves their confidence, viz. a veritable Russell by Watch.
