

IRISH LANDLORDS.—A RETURN has just been issued by the House of Commons about absenteeism. It appears that less than 20,000 persons own the soil of Ireland, of whom 5,892 own less than 100 acres. These, of course, are resident; and so are 5,580 more owning an average of 1,000 acres apiece; while only 1,113, owning altogether 3,115,314 acres, or one seventh of the soil, are usually resident outside the island. A considerable number—1,465—reside away from their properties, but still in Ireland, and the remaining few are occasional visitors. Absenteeism is therefore not among the great grievances of Ireland, more especially as many of the richest absentees are among the most spirited and lenient landlords. Lord Palmerston, for example was a much better man to live under than any resident landlord.
