Corrie and Wm. Currie. These three gentlemen are well known as successful business men and of irreproachable character. In the past the city has been some what unfortunate in not having men of this calibre offering themselves for civic office and now that the opportunity offers itself to give them the chance to display their ability in this line, the ratepayers would make

no mistake in supporting them.

There will also be three vacancies on the school board. The retiring members are Messrs. Herchmer, Cummings and Phillips, all of whom, are expected to offer themselves for re-election. The other members who have another term in office are A. Corrie and J. S. Irvine.
