

The sermon excited a good deal of surprise and not a little tent. It began as a war of conquest, on the part of Germany. From time comment, locally; but to-day Jerusa-lem is in the hands of the British.and a representative member of the British Parliament favors the repatriating of the Jews. The preacher of that occasion lays no claim to being a pro-phet, but only that prophecy is the nold of history." and prophecy, when properely interpreted, does show that the end of this age is not far off, and the world is soon to pass into another dispensation. It will not be "the end of the world," for there is no such phrase in the Greek New Testament, but the "end of the age," a phrase which is found there, and which is found there, and which will which will some day come.

It cannot be far off. Before the war began there were 140,000 Jews in Pal-estine. Many of them have perished in he war, but there must still be a arge number in that land. When the loor of Palestine is opened to them t may be expected that the orthodox lews from every nation will flock in possess the land.

The events of this war that are go-ing to mould the future of the world are not happening in Europe, but in Asia. It is not a thing of the world whether Alsace-Lorraine shall belong France or Germany, nor whether Germany shall retain Courtland or ot. The significance of those ques-ions is local. It is a thousandfold re significant that Great Britain has conquered a zone of territory stretching right across the empire of Turkey, thus dividing it into two parts; and that Jerusalem "the joy of the whole earth," has come into the posession of Britain and will be given over to the Jews-a homeland to homeless Israel. God pity them! They have had sorrows unspeakable. No Nation has wanted them; They have been in every persons way. Life and
