The Glencoe Transcript.

MUNICIPAL NOMINATIONS.

In Glencoe the nominations of municipal candidates on Monday were not without interest to the electors if the large number of nominations made is to be taken as a criterion. Some 9 or 10 names were proposed for the office of Reeve and 18 or 20 for councillors. All have withdrawn their names, however, since nomination day, with the exception of the following, who are elected by acclamation: Reeve, J. A. Leitch; councillors, Jno. P. McMillan, Jno. M. Corneil, Isaac McCracken W. A. Currie.

The meeting following the nominations was very orderly, and none of that cross-firing which so often characterizes meetings of this kind occurred. The speakers said their little say in a calm, quiet and unassuming manner, though some matters brought up for discussion were handled without regard as to whose corns were likely to suffer. Some fault was found with the old council for not accepting the gravel offered by the C. P. R. and for public improvements neglected.

Mr. Rathburn, who was retiring from the Reeveship, said they were waiting until Mosa council would undertake to gravel their portion of a section of the townline which they had until just recently refused to acknowledge as within their jurisdiction. Regarding the improvements which had seemingly been neglected, he thought it would be unfair to raise the taxes of the poor man any higher than they were to make improvements which could not be of any particular benefit to him. The poor as well as the rich and middle classes were to be considered. He had probably made mistakes—as who don't?—but they were mistakes of the head and not of the heart. He had endeavored faithfully to discharge the duties of his office for the best interests of the people as a whole. He thanked the electors very warmly for the confidence they had always seen fit to honor him with, and would continue to do his utmost for the welfare of the town.

Mr. Leitch spoke principally of county matters. He would like to see Middlesex get a fair proportion on account of the bridges between the city and county and did not believe in allowing London to feed her poor at our county poor house. These and other matters would receive his due attention in the county council, where he believed he had as much influence as any other citizen. Would like to see the foundry buildings which are lying idle running as a beet-root sugar or some such industry. He thought he would be able to secure gravel from both the C. P. R. and G. T. R., and a new passenger station was wanting from the latter which he would use his influence to secure for the village.

Mr. McMillan defended the old council. In regard to the C. P. R. gravel he nor no other councillor knew anything about the railway company's offer. The offer may have been made to the reeve, who sometimes undertook matters without consulting the other members of the council. He was a candidate for reeve. Had been four years in the council, had done a large business in grain in the village and would, if elected, continue to serve the best interests of the place.

Mr. McCracken refuted a statement made by Mr. Rathburn in the afternoon in regard to the CPR gravel to the effect that he (Rathburn) did not receive any offer of gravel from the C. P. R. Mr. McCracken produced a letter from the agent, Mr. Hill, certifying that the gravel had been offered to the village through Mr. Rathburn who did not accept it.

Mr. Corneil's address was lengthy. He found fault with the High School Board for increasing the principal's salary. If he was in the council another year he would use his influence to "bounce" the Board for their action in this matter. He considered outside pupils should pay a higher fee than resident pupils whose parents were taxed for maintaining the school.

Some explanations were asked for and were given by Mr. Harrison, showing that the county paid a certain proportion to the school, and it would be unfair to charge non-resident pupils more; besides the school was making a name for itself and the extra fee might have the effect of losing it pupils. The Legislature also provided a certain per centage of the cost of running the school, which per centage was increased by any increase in salaries paid or supplies furnished the school, so that the increase in the principal's salary would not add such

a great amount to the expenditure for the high school.

Mr. Charles thought the council should increase the rate of taxation and make the needed improvements in the village. That's what the council were put in office for.

Mr. Lethbridge was not a candidate. He would not undertake to run the village on 2 mills.

Messrs. Howard, Stuart, Younge and others of those nominated also spoke, thanking those who had nominated them, but declining the candidature, and the meeting adjourned after giving a hearty vote of thanks to the able chairman, Mr. Harrison.

Melbourne, Dec. 29th.—The annual Christmas tree, in connection with the Presbyterian Sunday school, on Christmas evening, was a great success. The long and interesting programme, consisting of music, readings, recitations and dialogues, was rendered by the scholars of the school, and formed one of the best entertainments ever presented to a Melbourne audience. The dialogues, "Going to a New Home," "Those Dreadful Girls," "Choice of Trades" and the "Colored Lecture," were all well given, the latter, delivered by Dan Sinclair, fairly bringing down the house. 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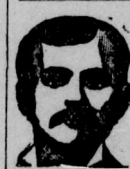
