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POLITICAL UNION.

An Organization in Windsor to Promote it.

The Members Give Their Reasons for Their Advocacy of the Change.

Windsor, Sept. 29.—For some time past the Review newspaper (Conservative) has been asserting that the N. P. has proved a thorough failure, and that the country must have independence, or, failing that, political union with the United States. This view is sustained by the Continental Club, a citizen organization which has just been established in this town, with Dr. Soper as president, Ald. Nash secretary, and Dr. Brien treasurer, and passed the following resolutions as their platform: Whereas, the census returns of the Dominion of Canada, recently issued by the Government, show the population of the Dominion to be but 4,823,344, an increase of less than 500,000, or only 11.52 per cent. during the past ten years, and

Whereas, while the immigration returns show that since 1881 1,000,000 immigrants in round numbers have arrived in Canada, the census returns exhibit an increase in population of but 500,000, showing that all our own natural increase as well as half the immigration during that period have left the country, and

Whereas, in a young country like Canada, embracing an area of 3,470,000 square miles, the increase in population should be approximate to the increase in the United States, a country similarly situated and its next neighbor, and in which the increase during the past ten years was 24 per cent., or about two and a third times greater than that of Canada and

Whereas, when the confederation was entered into the people of Canada were assured that by the year 1891 there would be 10,000,000 people in the country has been almost at a standstill as compared with the prosperous nation to the south of us on the same continent the burdens of the people have been increased out of all proportion to their ability to bear them, as for instance the debt which in 1871 was only \$21 per head of the population, has in 1891 grown to the enormous sum of within a fraction of \$50 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion, and the annual expenditure increased during the same period from \$3 to \$8 per head—that is WINDSOR, Sept. 29.
