BESTED BY A BEAR.

The Rocky Mountain Grizzly Was Too Much for Henry Mason.

NEWCASTLE, Wyo., May 30.—Henry Mason, a well-known citizen of this county, was killed by a bear on Friday night. He was in the morning to work on a mining claim a few miles away, telling his wife he would be home in the evening. A short distance from the house he saw the tracks of a bear. He followed the trail about three miles into a canyon, where he discovered the animal—a large grizzly. He fired one shot without effect, when his Winchester refused to work.

The bear then attacked him. Mason attempted to escape by climbing a tree, but the bear wrenched the gun from him and maimed in the tree until the bear had disappeared, when he came down and started for home. He had not gone far when the bear again pounced upon him and mangled his body in a terrible manner, 38 distinct bites being found. Mason not returning, a searching party was organized next day. His body was found, and not far away was the bear. After a hard fight he was killed. The bear measured 7 feet in length and weighed 600 pounds.

Two Ottawa Children Instantly Killed.

OTTAWA, May 30.—Two children—a boy aged 7 and a girl aged 9—belonging to Geo. McDonald, a gardener, were run over by an electric street car this morning. Both were instantly killed.

Tried to End Her Life.

NAGARA FALLS, May 30.—Just after 8 o'clock Sunday night the strollers below the inclined railway at the Prospect Park saw a young lady walk out on a projecting rock and throw herself into the water. The current here is quite swift, and was fast carrying the young lady out into the river, when two young men of this place, B. F. Vandenberg and S. Devlin, ran to rescue her. Devlin quickly threw aside his hat and coat and jumped into the water, and after a struggle succeeded in bringing her to the shore, where Mr. Vandenberg landed them safely on dry ground. The young woman was taken to police headquarters, where dry clothing was furnished, and a physician called. As soon as he arrived he made an examination, and ordered the would-be suicide to be taken to a hotel, as she was about to become a mother. She was taken to the American, where a few hours later she gave birth to a healthy male child.

The Keary Case.

Adjourned Meeting of the Investigating Committee.

More Evidence Taken, and Mr. Meredith Asks for Fair Play.

Decision To Be Made on Thursday Night.

Attempt to Throw the Blame in the Matter on Chief Williams.

Some Fun at the Meeting—A Leagues Witness—The Mayor is an Expelled Orangeman, He Says—Mr. Keary Retorts His Defense—An Appeal for an Unbiased Verdict.

Ald. Coe presided at the adjourned investigation into the Keary charges last night. There were also present: Mayor Esser, Ald. Shaw, Taylor, Wilford, Thos. Jones, James Fitzgerald, City Solicitor Meredith, High Constable Schram, John Boyd, Mr. Keary, Detectives Nickle and Rider, Sergt. Crawford, Richard Wright and several other witnesses and onlookers. Mr. John Boyd made a written statement to the effect that after reading Mr. Keary's statement in the Free Press, where he said that he met the patrol wagon and told him (Boyd) where the man was that was wanted. This Mr. Boyd denied. Keary did not even point his finger in the direction of the disturbance, but continued leisurely along.

Mr. G. W. Yates, with whom Mr. Keary had the conversation the day after the trial, was present. His statement was as follows:

"As Mr. Keary has seen fit to question my veracity in the matter of the conversation I had with him on the day after the Burke-Wilson trial, it is only fair that I should explain my position in this case, lest my silence be misconstrued. To begin with, I am not in the informing line, and when Mr. Crawford based his report on the chaffing conversation I had with Mr. Rider, and used my name in it several times without consulting my wishes, I did not think I had been fairly treated, and determined to let the police department finish the case as they had started it—without my aid. For that reason I refused to draw up an indictment against Mr. Keary when I was requested to do so by the police. I had not willfully informed on the man and would not stand as his accuser. I was around the police station as usual on the day in question, and had talked to Mr. Keary, as I had daily for months. When he told me what he knew about the matter he appeared to regret that his evidence had not been taken. I thought it strange myself, and when, a few minutes later, in the trial room, Mr. Rider was bewailing what he thought to be a miscarriage of justice, I told him that he had himself to blame for not working up all the evidence. He said he had got every witness, and I asked him what about Keary. 'Why, that does he know about it?' Mr. Rider asked. And then it was that I repeated what Mr. Keary had told me a few minutes before. Sergt. Crawford, I remember, was present, and his report of the conversation is, to the best of my knowledge, correct. Mr. Keary always treated me well, and if I had thought that such a serious charge was to have been the outcome I would have kept my own counsel."

Neither Mr. Meredith or Mr. Love had any questions to ask the foregoing witnesses, and Mr. Love proceeded to read statements from Mr. John A. Graham, Patrick Kelly, R. W. Ward, Samuel Glass and High Constable Schram, each of which was to the effect that Mr. Keary had not come into the courtroom until Mr. McPhillips, the counsel for the prisoner, was addressing the jury. Mr. Kelly said in his letter that Mr. Perrin was utterly mistaken in his statement when he says that he (Perrin) sat in the seat along with Mr. Keary and himself. The seat would only hold two, and it was impossible that three could have sat on it. Mr. Kelly also stated that Mr. Crawford was wrong when he said that Mr. Keary came in and sat beside him (Crawford) and Mr. Perrin, while the chief was in the box. He further stated that Mr. Keary left the courtroom during the judge's address. Each of the above-named was willing to swear to the facts detailed by them.

MR. PHAIR'S WILL.
Mr. Frank Love raised the point that Mr. Phair's will had been taken and his ante-mortem statement was not. If this statement had been taken it would have proven beyond doubt whether or not the arrest was justifiable. As proof of this assertion Mr. Love read the following: "I, Francis Love, do hereby certify that I searched in the Surrogate Court clerk's office here, and ascertained that the late Harry Phair made his last will and testament on the 15th day of October last, whereby he disposed of vacant lots, and houses and lots, in London West and on Richmond street north and south. He also disposed of personal property consisting of money, gold watch, and that there was a considerable number of legatees and devisees mentioned in the said will, to whom the said properties were respectively bequeathed and devised, namely, children, grandchildren, stepdaughter and a sister in New York, and I further state that the said Harry Phair himself, in his own handwriting, signed the said will, and it was witnessed by A. Brown and M. P. Talling, and his executors appointed by him in said will were Mr. Hudson, his daughter and his step-daughter."

Mr. Love then asked that Mr. Keary be allowed to reply to some questions put to him. In the course of his answers Mr. Keary again denied that the chief was in the witness box when he went into the steps leading to the judge's bench, and Mr. McPhillips was addressing the jury. He left the court room during the judge's charge. As regards Mr. Rutherford, the last recollection he had of having spoken to him was about two years ago, when Mr. Rutherford was in company with a Mr. Hewitt. It was impossible, he again reiterated, that he could have seen Burke exposing himself from where he was. He again went over his conversation with the chief on the day of the murder, in which he told the latter what he knew about the matter. He then told the chief that if his evidence was of any use to call on him, he and Mr. Phair were always the best of friends. He had known him for 35 or 40 years, and would have no object in the concealing of evidence. His sympathies were entirely the other way.

Mr. Love then produced Mr. Richard Wright, mail gatherer. Mr. Wright saw the drunken man and the boy on the day of the murder. He also

passed and saluted Mr. Keary on his way up. Burke was not misbehaving himself more than any other man would be under the same circumstances. Mr. Keary could not have seen Burke exposing himself, if he had then he (Wright) would also have noticed it.

"I and my boy, who was driving," continued Mr. Wright, "were looking back when we saw that Phair would molest the drunken man when he had a sober companion to look after him. I saw Phair throw him down. A woman could have done it; I could have thrown him down myself with my left hand. And I was in Woodstock, or even Hamilton, and a man came up, without a uniform, and threw me down, I—Mr. Wright was interrupted. He meant to say that he would certainly have resisted in such event.

The mayor proceeded to cross-examine him as to Phair's position when he (Wright) passed him. Mr. Wright would not swear to a foot or a yard, but if to-morrow would do he would go up and measure the distance. The mayor then asked why Mr. Wright was so positive about other matters and so indefinite on this point.

"Well, I don't care whether you believe me or not," retorted Mr. Wright.

"Well, I don't believe your statements, then," answered the mayor.

"I am an Orangeman. You are an insulting man, and an expelled Orangeman, too. And I was secretary of the lodge that expelled you," added Mr. Wright.

Mr. Wright then took his departure. "I would not be so mean as to try to hurt a man on account of his religion, even if I am an Orangeman and he a Roman Catholic," Mr. Wright was heard to say as he stepped out into the corridor. This closed the case, and Mr. Meredith then began a lengthy address to the committee. "All that Mr. Keary asks for in this investigation," he said, "is a simple fair play, and I hope and trust that he will receive it at the hands of this committee, no matter how it may be composed, and no matter whether you differ from him in religion or not. He is deserving of fair play, and he has lived in this city upwards of 50 years. He has also been a non-commissioned officer in her Majesty's army, and has been in the service of the city eight years. In view of these facts he is entitled to the fullest consideration in the case." Mr. Meredith then went exhaustively into the evidence and sought to show that Chief Williams was the man to blame for the lack of evidence at the trial. He held that he had neglected his duty, but as the blame must somewhere it had been placed on Mr. Keary's shoulders. Mr. Meredith closed with an appeal to the aldermen not to let their minds be biased by religious beliefs, creeds or societies. "Do not let it be said that no Irish Catholic can ask for justice from the Council of the City of London because the latter are Orangemen and Protestants."

Mr. Love followed and endeavored to show that the charge made by Mr. Crawford had not been substantiated—none of the witnesses had proven the alleged exposure of Burke.

The committee privately considered the matter for an hour, and then adjourned until Thursday night to make a decision.

LAST YEAR'S PROGRESS.

Young Men's Christian Association Annual Meeting.

Reports From Various Branches—Election of Directors—Resolution of Condolence.

The annual meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors last evening. Mr. J. I. Anderson, vice-president, was in the chair, and there were present Secretaries Sayer and about 25 members of the association. The usual devotional exercises preceded the business.

Mr. Anderson read the report of the membership committee, which stated that the number of members was 239 this year, 301 last year, and 304 the previous year. There were 102 active members, 59 associate, 120 junior, 28 honorary and 2 life.

The reception committee report was read by A. McPherson and showed that eight receptions had been held, with an attendance of 339 members.

The extension fund report, submitted by W. J. Lind, showed total collections of \$116.35 and an unexpended balance of \$45.16. There were 87 subscribers.

Secretary Sayer read the devotional committee's report. They had conducted 253 meetings, at which the attendance had been 6,050. Of the 108 members dealt with personally about 16 had joined various churches.

The boys' work report was read by W. J. Lind. Regular meetings had been held each Friday evening with a total attendance of 1,824 and an average of 35. The membership was 120, an increase of 11 over last year.

In connection with this matter a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Lind for his active interest in the work.

Mr. R. Breiner reported that although the membership was largely decreased, the bicycle club was still in existence.

Bart Howard reported for the boating club. The club was a means of holding the members together during the warm season. The membership last year was 32, and nine boats had been contracted for this year. At least one "howl" had been caught last season. The Canadian Y. M. C. A. Boating Club organized in London, and other cities were following the example. The club would entertain the association at Springbank on June 23.

All the reports were adopted. On the suggestion of Mr. Lind a portion of the extension fund will be set aside for the furnishing of a new building.

A resolution of condolence with the wife and family of Sheriff Glass will be forwarded, expressing the hope that Mr. Glass should recover his former good health.

Canadian Pacific earnings for April, 1893: Gross earnings, \$1,599,214; working expenses, \$1,024,000; net profits, \$575,214. The decrease in net profits over the same period last year is for April \$37,418, and from Jan. 1 to April 30, \$212,992.

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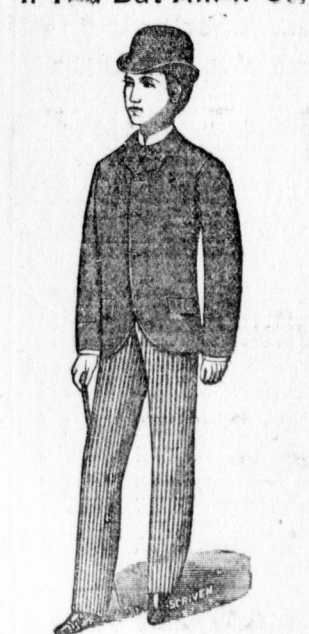
