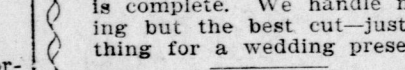

ST. ANDREW'S CENTURY FUND.

At a meeting of the century fund committee of St. Andrew's Church last evening, it was announced that the fund now amounts to \$13,500. Several other sums already subscribed will be received in the course of a few days, which, it is expected, will bring the total up to \$14,000. It is very probable that before the meeting of the General Assembly in June the \$15,000 which Dr. Johnston asked the congregation to raise will be realized. The offering has been a general one from the whole congregation, and no personal pressure has been brought to bear upon any one member of the church.

It was decided at the commencement that after the object of the fund had been stated every subscription should be voluntary. Several individual subscriptions of \$500 have been received in response to the appeal.

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ENTERTAINED 7TH REGIMENT BAND

Major Denison Compliments Bandmaster and Musicians on Their Creditable Work.

Buchanan's departure for Toronto, yesterday, was addressed on the barrack square by Major S. J. A. Denison, C. M. He also thanked them for their kindness in turning out, their action showing the good feeling existing between the two corps, a feeling that had been of long standing in this city, and one that he hoped would continue.

Bandmaster Hiscott thanked Major Denison for his kind remarks. Before leaving the barracks the band was entertained to refreshments by Major Denison.

The kindest of feelings have always existed between the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the 7th Regiment and the Royal Canadian Regiment at London. It is on occasions such as these that the friendship is still further cemented.

Deaths of a Day.

Donald A. Lathshaw, an editorial writer on the Kansas City Star, died last night of consumption, aged 41 years. He had been sporting editor of the Chicago Tribune.

Rev. Harry Scadding, D.D., is dead, aged 82. He was the most venerable figure on the streets of Toronto in recent years. His father was factor on Governor Simcoe's English estate, and came to Canada shortly after the foundation of the Province of Upper Canada by Simcoe. Dr. Scadding was born in England in 1813, and came to this country a lad of 18. He was the first "head boy" of Upper Canada College. Completing his education in England he became rector of Holy Trinity Church in Toronto, and retaining the post until advancing years compelled his resignation. It is as an author, however, that Dr. Scadding was best known.

In the death of Mr. George Fletcher, Monday morning, at Hamilton, an old and highly esteemed resident of that city passed away. Deceased was in his 74th year, and came to Canada from England in 1854. For many years he carried on a crockery and glassware business. The late Mr. Fletcher was a prominent figure in Methodist Church circles, and for many years a trustee of Wesley Church. He was a lifelong Liberal.

Edward Redhead, who wrote the tune of the "Rock of Ages," is dead. For years he was known as the champion of Gregorian music. He had been organist of St. Mary's Church, Paddington, England, since 1854, set many well-known hymns to music, and composed various pieces.

John D. Gorman, a well-known actor of the old school, who has been the assistant stage manager of the American Theater for some time, died Monday in New York of blood poisoning. He was 61 years old. 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CONDITIONS OF THE LAND GRANT.

Settlers Will Be Allowed All Timber But Pine, and All Minerals Not Under License.

The secretary of the London Veterans' Association is forwarding the names of all the members on its rolls who are entitled to the land grant.

Under the terms of the act every grant of land is subject to the reservation of pine timber only. The Los Reyes mines to leave the property of the person who receives the grant; and enough pine is also allowed settlers for fences, barns, houses, etc., under the amendment to the act respecting timber or public lands.

All minerals found on the property belong to the settler, unless already under license to a mining company or a miner.
