RUSSIA PRESENTS A NOVEL EXCUSE

Declares Kisheneff Massacre "Natural Phenomenon."

INVESTIGATION A TRAVESTY

The Times Applauds President Roosevelt for Forwarding Petition to Czar.

London, June 30.—The Times yesterday published from "a correspondent" instructive details regarding the Kisheneff inquiry. Davidovich, one of the investigating judges, has communicated an article to the Bessarabets, attempting to demonstrate that it is impossible to prosecute anybody for the massacre on the ground that it was a "natural phenomenon." Plenty of evidence is forthcoming when the Odessa procurator, Polak, arrived, because the culprits had not concealed their share in the outrages, believing that they had carried out the orders of the Government. Polak had one thousand of them arrested. But things were altered after he left. The magistrates tried to efface the evidence. One of them refused to allow a post-mortem on the murdered and violated victims. Photographs of the bodies were not permitted, and the survivors were ordered to clean the houses where the murders were committed before the police examined them.

In one instance a Jew was killed and all the members of the family were severely wounded and taken to the hospital, and his widow was condemned to one month's imprisonment for not removing the traces of murder. The magistrate, deputed to take evidence in cases of assault, refused to take the accusations, and treated cases as mere bagatelles. He altered the purport of the evidence of some of the wounded persons, whereupon one of the public prosecutors, Mr. Polak, the law has been broken by the release of prisoners without the order of the public prosecutor. Only a small proportion of the rioters have been tried, many have been acquitted, and the rest have been condemned to trivial penalties, such as a few days in the penitentiary or a few months' imprisonment.

In an editorial, referring to the Russian refusal to receive the American Hebrews' petition, the Times says: "However real the Jewish question in Russia, which, apparently, represents the policy of ostracism meted out to the Jews, it is not the Russian statesmanship in this respect, still less can they be used to palliate the horrible scenes of murder and plunder recently enacted at Kisheneff. It seems, indeed, as if the Russian statesmanship in Russia was beginning to totter under the too vast weight of that colossal and still unexplored empire."

"No country is so favorably situated as the United States for undertaking to bring home to the Russian Government the feelings that the tragedy has universally provoked." It is hoped that the Russian bureaucracy will be able to consign the petition officially transmitted by the Government of a great and friendly power to the limbo of a ministerial pigeon-hole.

ROSEBERY'S PLAN

He Proposes the Establishment of a Great Educational Place.

London, June 29.—The Earl of Rosebery has written to the chairman of the London County Council submitting a plan for the establishment of a great institution for advanced scientific and technological education at a cost of £1,500,000, towards which sum Lord Rosebery asks the council for an annual grant of \$150,000 for the maintenance of the institution upon securing which the whole scheme depends.

In his letter submitting the proposal Lord Rosebery says: "It is short of scandalous that our ambitious youths should be obliged to resort to the United States and Germany for technical training." He points out that British industries are suffering in consequence of the neglect of this important branch of education in the United Kingdom.

She Gets a Judgment From the Court of \$3,000 for Breach of Promise.

Glens Falls, June 30.—After several legal skirmishes the deputy sheriff has sold the personal property of James P. Titmore, the Glens Falls blacksmith, to satisfy a judgment for \$3,000 for breach of promise obtained by Frances Pettit, who on the trial produced her diary, which was put in evidence, showing that during the courtship defendant had kissed plaintiff exactly 1,236 times. The defendant's home-made automobile, in which he had been wont to take his promisee bride riding, sold for \$950. Despite objections to the sale of the blacksmith's tools because he is a blacksmith, wagonmakers' tools because he is a wagonmaker, farming tools because he is a farmer, jeweler's tools because he is a watch repairer, household goods because he is the head of a family, and a lawn mower because he is a gentleman, all were sold. The total realized \$250. A levy was then made on the real estate, which will be advertised and sold, the proceeds to apply on the judgment.

DOES IT MEAN WAR?

Leading Japanese Statesmen Urge an Aggressive Manchurian Policy.

London, June 30.—According to the Tokyo correspondent of the Times, the excitement in Japan over the Manchurian situation is increasing, and the matter is plainly resolved to support the Government in all measures which are essential to assert the rights and safeguard the interests of the country. Marquis Ito and Count Yamagata, who hitherto advised a waiting policy, now it is understood advocate resolute action by the Japanese Government.

RUSSIA AND JAPAN

Kuropatkin Said to Have Arranged an Understanding.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—The visit of the Russian minister, General Kuropatkin, to Japan, has, according to the Japanese newspapers, had a very satisfactory effect on the relations between Russia and Japan and has paved the way for a rapprochement.

Media, June 30.—Six persons have been wounded on the three great trolley car between Media and Chester. A negro, believed to have been seeking revenge because the conductors of the car recently ejected him, discharged both barrels of a shot gun at the car as it passed a lonely spot in the country.

The car was crowded. Four women were among the wounded. The negro made his escape.

THE NORTH GREY CASE

Boyd's Appeal Against Election of Mackay Is Allowed.

Toronto, June 30.—The court of appeal delivered several judgments yesterday morning. In the North Grey election case, in which Mr. Boyd, the defeated Conservative candidate, petitioned against the election of A. G. MacKay, in the provincial by-election of Jan. 7, Boyd's appeal was allowed. Judge McLean said that the petition on a technicality, that a copy of the petition had not been filed with the local registrar. The court of appeal has decided that time should have been allowed to remedy this mistake.

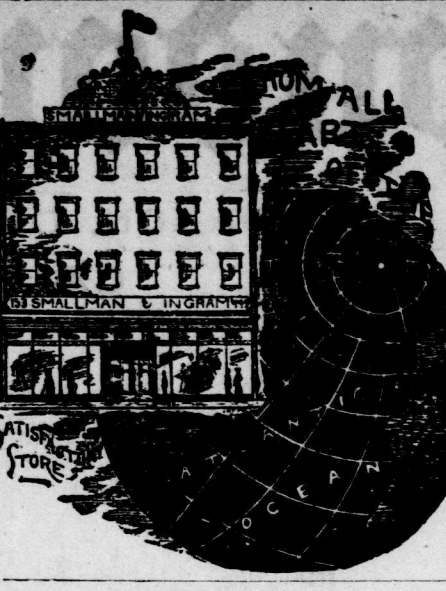

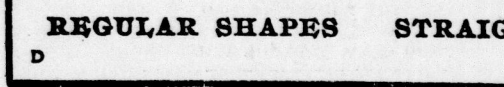
