There was no heavy hitting by either team, the total for the entire game being fifteen, of which Boston had ten and Detroit five. The game was a close one, the Detroit only had two errors chalked up against them.

Another long game yesterday was played at Philadelphia between the Chicago and Philadelphia nines. It was not as long, however, as the game at Boston, neither was it as close. At the end of the ninth inning, the teams were tied, the score being 41. Neither club scored in the tenth, and in the eleventh each secured a run, making the score 5-5. Philadelphia made another run in the twelfth inning and won the game.

In the Eastern League a twelve-inning game was played at Providence between the Quakers and the Montreal nine. Providence won, the score standing 3 to 2. Toronto was also on the losing side of the fence yesterday.

The best game of the National was at Chicago between the Chicago and Philadelphia nines. The Phillies won, with one run to their credit, as against a shut-out for their opponents.
