I have been approached to establish the plant in Georgia, but I prefer to come Canada, where there is a virgin field. We will have no competition here. whereas there are 50 cutlery factories in the United States. I do not consider the English and German goods as competition. We have driven them out of the United States markets, and our factory here would have nothing to fear from them."

Continuing, Mr. Eastman said the industry, if established in London, would give work at the beginning to not less than 50 hands, but more likely to 100. Some of these would be girls, who would make good money at light work. such as wrapping up, etc. Young men could also be taught a profitable trade in about twelve months. He would bring many skilled men to London. "Do you compel your apprentices to stay any certain term with you? asked Mr. Scarlett

"No, we do not," Mr. Eastman replied. "That is getting back to the dark ages. If a man can do our work satisfactorily in a year, we pay him what he is worth. It's ability not age. we're after. I have a son 19 years of age who is capable of managing my factory.'
