LEADERS CROSS SWORDS

Labor Member Objects to Financial Help for the Salvation Army-The Bread Bill.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, March 1.-Further and final supplementary estimates for 1910 were laid before the Legislature yesterday afternoon. The main estimates for 1911 are being prepared and will be laid before the House before prorogation. This forehandedness is a result of the change made last session, when the close of the financial year was shifted forward two months, the year now ending on Oct. 31 instead of Dec. 31. The supplementaries brought down vesterday totalled \$804,584, the largest single department of expenditure being that of colonization roads, which re-ceive no less than \$464,356, which is divided as follows: Northern division, \$121,907; west division, \$28,050; east division, \$69,146; Temiskaming district, \$57,980. In addition there are liberal provisions for trunk roads in the mining districts, including \$60,000 for a general fund, and specific grants as follows: Sudbury-Soo trunk, \$30. 000; Elk Lake to Gowganda road, \$35,-000, and Charlton to Elk Lake road,

Many additional salary increases are provided for, and nearly every clerk nd stenographer now enjoys an in-C. C.
