Choir Boy Countenance Enabled Lad
To Steal Wholesale.

New York, Nov. 15.—The choir-boy
face of Raymond Beck, a 14-year-old
Brooklyn boy, blue-eyed and golden
haired, made burglary so easy that he
told the police today he had robbed
some 25 places he could not remember
them all. When the police found a
buried can full of jewelry, to which
the lad had directed them, they expect
to learn more about his exploits. Ray-
mond was arrested last night in
theater. His love of the footlights
caused him to use a stolen ticket, and
this led to his detection. Between sobs
the boy confessed a career of thievery,
which, the police say, is without par-
allel for one so young.

MAY DISSOLVE BOARD

Chicago Butter and Eggs Exchange at
Odds With Government.

[Canadian Press.]
Chicago, Nov. 15.—A surprise equal
to that caused by the action of the
Chicago butter and egg board when on
Monday it forced up the prices of
butter and eggs, came today, when it
became known that the board had just
as suddenly cut the price to the fig-
ures which prevailed on Saturday last.
The board, which is under investiga-
tion by the Government, cut the price
of butter from 33 to 32 cents a pound.
The board reduced the price of eggs
from 26 to 25 cents a dozen, and 28
cents to the Saturday price of 25 and
27 cents.
United States District Attorney Wil-
kinson said the price committee of the
butter and egg board would be given a
chance to explain its action of Mon-
day in the chancery hearings this
week in the Government suit to dis-
solve the board.

A NEW MAINE CLUE

Fresh Evidence That External Ex-
plosion Destroyed the Battleship.

[Canadian Press.]
Havana, Nov. 15.—Exploration of
the bottom of the Maine, about 120
feet off the bow, reveals a plate,
identified as forming a portion of the
water-tight skin of the ship on the por-
side, near the keel, and under the
magazines, as having been blown in-
ward, the upper part being folded in-
ward. This apparently could result
only from external pressure. The en-
gineer in charge and the other offi-
cers are maintaining reticence, but the
discovery is strongly confirmatory of
the theory of an external explosion.
One body was recovered yesterday
from the boiler room. It was that of
an unusually tall man.

BAD DETROIT BLAZE

Quarter Million Dollar Blaze in a Jef-
ferson Warehouse.

[Canadian Press.]
Detroit, Mich., Nov. 15.—Fire, which
for a time threatened a portion of De-
troit business section, broke out last
night on the fourth floor of the Jef-
ferson Warehouse, a building owned by
Garton & Willis Wholesale Mil-
linery Company on Jefferson avenue.
The blaze got beyond control and a
blizzard hampered the firemen.
After a two-hour fight the firemen
succeeded in saving the costly ad-
joining buildings and getting the blaze
under fair control. The loss probably
will not be more than \$250,000.

A BREAK FOR LIBERTY

Sea Lion Breaks From Theatre and
Almost Reaches Lake Michigan.

AMOY REVOLT QUIET

Foreign Consuls Are Assured That
Their Property Will Be Pro-
tected.

Amoy, China, Nov. 15.—The Repub-
licans who took form today in the
city yesterday, have issued an ad-
dress to the foreign consuls in which
the neutrality of the latter is re-
quested, and assurance given that
their property, including the churches,
will be protected.
The city remained quiet today. The
British cruiser Monmouth is relieving
the British sloop Rosario.
Hui Cheng, on the mainland, south-
west of Amoy, has gone over to the
revolutionists. The city magistrate
has been a prisoner.

STRIKERS DEFEATED

New York Wins Fight With Its Strik-
ing Garbage Teamsters.

New York, Nov. 15.—No doubt re-
mains that the city has won its fight
with the garbage and ash men. The
work progressed as fast today as un-
der normal conditions. The city ad-
ministration has emerged victorious
from its first serious strike, and es-
tablished its right to dictate hours of
labor to its many thousands of em-
ployees.
Night work, to avoid which the drivers
struck a week ago, will be resumed
as usual tomorrow. The city has
forced the garbage men to get out
of the city. The danger of a general teamsters'
strike remains, but, judging from the
action of the union, it is remote.

**LOOKING UP HEIRS
OF A VAST ESTATE**

Four and Half Millions For Dis-
tribution Amongst a Family
of Perrins.

[Canadian Press.]
Brantford, Nov. 15.—Josiah Armit-
age, of this city, acting for his sister,
Mrs. J. J. Perrin, Lindsay, is engaged
in looking up members of the Perrin
family interested in the estate of four
and a half millions, which has been
accumulating in England for 200 years,
and which, it was announced, had
been claimed by Dr. Thomas Perrin,
San Jose, California. Mrs. Perrin had
prior to the announcement from Califor-
nia, sent a lawyer to England to
investigate, and she is able to trace her
family back to 1777. Dr. Charles Per-
rin said he is one of the principal
heirs still in this city, but refuses to
give any information on the sub-
ject. Mrs. Perrin, Lindsay, is the
widow of the late John James Perrin,
who, she claims, was a cousin of the
principal heirs of the big estate.

A STRANGE SHOOTING

Boy Mysteriously Wounded on Streets
of Washington, D. C.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 15.—Stand-
ing at the corner of a street last night,
waiting to board a car, a young boy
Louis Troutman, 20 years old, fell
across the street car tracks with a
bullet in his skull, just as his mother
alighted from a car and started to
ward him. Mrs. Troutman swooned
as she questioned the wounded boy in
a vain effort to learn something about
the shooting. Young Troutman was
removed to a hospital, where, it is said,
he is not expected to recover.

SHOT IN THE WRIST

Terrible Revenge Taken on a Man
Who Labeled Yuan.

[Canadian Press.]
London, Nov. 15.—A Tien Tsin dis-
patch to the Daily Mail says that
General Chang, commanding the
northern Chinese army, recently spoke
of the shooting of Yuan Shi Kai, has been
shot in the wrist. The shooting is at-
tributed to Yuan's daily Mail from
Han Kow, dated Tuesday, says that
a heavy artillery duel is going on be-
tween the imperialists and revolu-
tionists, the imperial troops suffering
the most damage.

FLOCK TO MURDER TRIAL

Immense Crowd Gathers Expecting to
Hear Confession of Accused.

[Canadian Press.]
Springfield, Mass., Nov. 15.—With
the expectation of hearing the alleged
confession of Bertram G. Spencer
that he murdered Miss Martha B.
Blackstone, the school teacher on the
night of March 31, 1910, an immense
crowd surged about the court house
here today where Spencer is being
tried for his life. This confession,
which the police declare they secured
from Spencer, shortly after his ar-
rest, has never been made public. It
has been authoritatively stated, how-
ever, that Spencer, in the confession,
laid bare his career for three years
previous to his arrest, admitting that
he was the man who caused a reign
of terror throughout Western Mass-
achusetts by daring robberies, and
telling in detail of the killing of Miss
Blackstone in the home of Mrs. Sarah
J. Dow.

ART AWARDS.

Rome, Nov. 15.—The grand jury at
the international art exposition to
whom is intrusted the final award of
prizes today decided ten grand prizes
for paintings and sculptures, eight
grand prizes for workers in black and
white, and twenty second prizes. Four
of the members are Italians.
American artists were excluded from
the competition because of the closing
of their pavilion by the American
commissioner-general, Harrison S.
Morrison, Oct. 31, when the insurance
was permitted to lapse, and he was
not willing to expose the \$500,000 worth
of exhibits to possible danger from loss
by fire.

**SYNDICATE TAKES OVER
MICHIGAN UNITED**

Lease Provides for \$3,265,000 to Be Made
in Improvements.

Battle Creek, Mich., Nov. 15.—That the
Michigan United Railways, including the
city lines of Kalamazoo, Battle Creek,
Lansing and Jackson, will be run by the
E. W. Clark syndicate, of Philadelphia,
"for 99 years" is semi-officially admit-
ted here.
The Clark syndicate agree to pay the
interest required by the English owners
of the M. U. R., keeping all over this
figure.
The lease provides for the expenditure
of \$3,265,000 in improvements, the Cana-
dian Trust Company taking \$1,745,000
of bonds and the investment regis-
try, of London, \$1,520,000 worth.
For the purpose of operating the M.
U. R., the syndicate will incorporate a
branch, capitalized at \$2,000,000.
One of the first improvements will be
to electrify the fruit belt line, thereby
contributing much to the comfort of the
passengers.
The Clark syndicate will have a small
telephone through which his voice coming
