### FEW UNEMPLOYED RESULT OF WAR

London Board of Trade Sum marizes Conditions-Hours Are Reduced.

LONDON, Sept. 11 .- The board of trade summarizes the result of its in quiries as to the effect of the war on employment as follows:

The general conclusion is that at the moment there is a contraction of employment. This has been met to very marked extent by a reduction of hours instead of a reduction of staffs. Ninety-three per cent of the working people engaged in production are still wholly or partially employed.

"The returns show that of the con traction of 7 per cent in the number employed, at least two-thirds represent men who have left for military service. # Regina Board of Trade Takes

Initiative in Move—Entire West Interested.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.-A proposal put forward by the Regina Board of Trade for very materially increasing the crop area and output in Western Canada has been very favorably commented on today in Winnipeg banking and financial circles. The proposal is embodied in an official circular calling for a general meeting to be had at some central point in the Canadian prairie west, at which this object shall be discussed by representatives of the Do-minion and Provincial Governments, the business and producing interests. as well as financial institutions and

the railways. This circular points out that the world's greatest need in the near future must be food, that this is the opportunity of Canada, which thus will be able to meet its obligations on the tremendous amount of capital invested in the Dominion during

At the present time Canadian cities are full of unemployed, thrown on their own resources through stoppage of railway construction, city building and the like.
