SARNIA WINS IN THE OIL TOWN FOR FIRST TIME IN 7 YEARS

Petrolia Is Beaten by Score of 13 to 6 on Home Grounds by Strong Tunnel Town Squad—The Game Was a Very Strenuous One.

Contrary to expectations, the Sarnia line was not as heavy as the Petrolia one, but Coach Dore, who has taught the boys from the Tunnel Town how to smother the backs, hence Petrolia gave up the bucking game early in the fray, and relied a lot on outside kicks to gain the ground. Their line did not show the vim they displayed in London, but the back division showed a lot of improvement over the game of a week ago. However, it was not in the same class with the back field of Sarnia, who have two extremely fast men in McCart, who punts as far as his own Johnny Ross, and who tore off several long runs in Sarnia's best style, and Brady who is a sure catch, and a runner of no mean ability.

Stretcher Was Hurt. For Petrolia, Stretcher and Pollard, on the wing, did good work, as did Stretcher and Gleason on the back division. The Hard Oils were much weakened shortly before half-time, when Stretcher hurt his knee and was forced to retire. Harding, who took his place, is but 17. 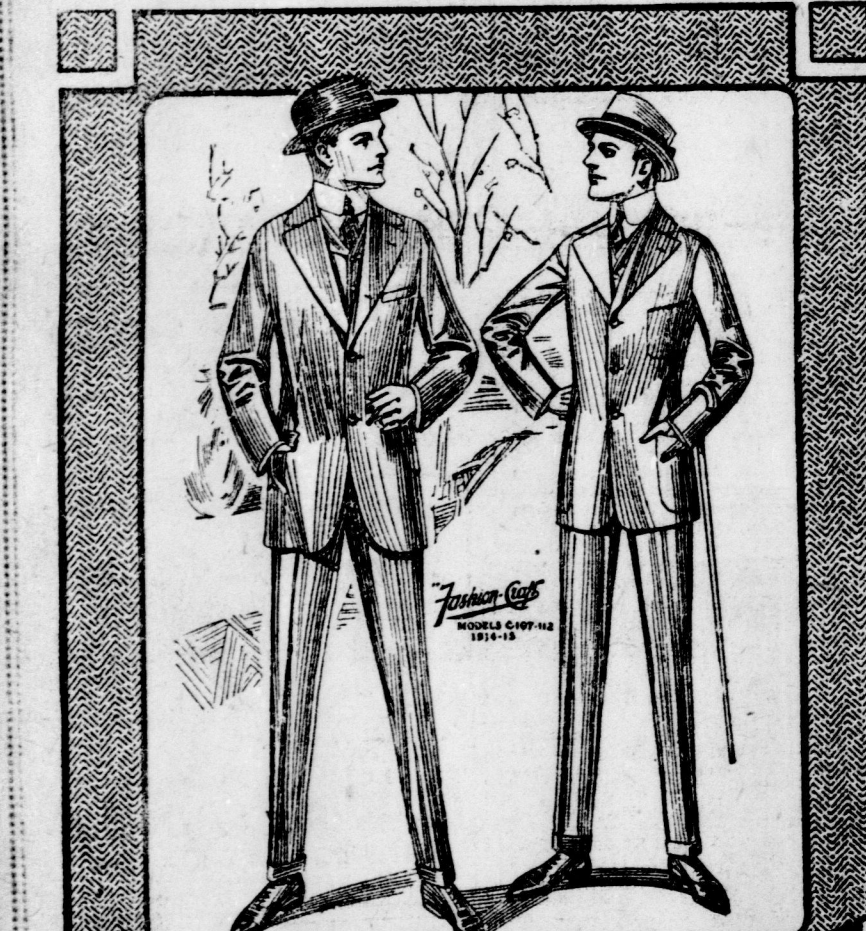
