INGERSOLL TAX RATE
MAY BE 27 1-2 MILLS

One Mill Higher Than Last Year—May Extend Waterworks.

INGERSOLL, June 4.—Important recommendations in the reports of committees will come before the council Monday night. The estimates have been under consideration by the finance committee, and the decision has been reached that the rate be struck at 27½ mills on the dollar. This rate includes the one mill provincial war tax, and about half a mill, the town's contribution to the patriotic fund. The rate is one mill higher than a year ago.

The water, light and sewer commission will ask for \$10,000 for additions and extensions to the water plant. By resolution of the board of works, Ernest J. Holland, city engineer of Guelph, has been engaged to do the engineering work required in connection with the proposed pavements.

METHODISTS POINT
TO OTHERS' FAULTS

Committee Says Churches Neglect Their Duties to Foreigners.

MEMORIAL TO DEAD
Impressive Service Held for Clergymen Who Passed Away During Year.

[By Staff Reporter.]
ST. MARYS, June 4.—That Italians in London do not go to church on Sunday, and, although members of the Roman Catholic Church, pay little attention to their religious duties, was the pith of the report brought in by the foreign emigration committee of the London conference at its meeting held this afternoon.

That the Jews in London were not showing the activity in civic work they should show, was also the contention of this committee which considered that the Methodist Church was capable of doing more work than it was doing in relation to the foreign population at present residing within the borders of Canada. That Baptists had not shown the right Christian spirit in their work among the Russians in London was also dwelt upon, and the fact that the Methodists had gone ahead despite the fact that an interdenominational agreement among the churches in the Forest City existed, was made the hub for the statement that followers of Methodism had at least attempted to lead their foreigner into the right path. About 5,000 citizens of foreign birth at present resided within the confines of the London conference, and the work needed to bring these into correlation with the church was rather pressing, stated the report. The statistical committee brought in

its report as did also the education committee.

Impressive Memorial Service. The memorial service was very impressive, words of praise and sorrow were said for those who had passed away during the year in the London conference. These were Rev. David Ryan, of London; Rev. William McDonagh, of Toronto; Rev. Benjamin Clement, of Goderich; and Rev. Jas. B. Kennedy, of Kingsville. Miss Bowes, of Toronto, a deaconess connected with the girls' schools in the Queen City, gave a splendid resume of the work done by the department in the Methodist Church. She gave several examples showing that although young women sometimes did as they ought not to do when the right influences were brought to bear they always came back to the proper way of thinking and lived pure and righteous lives. W. McMillen, assistant editor of The Guardian, gave a talk on the work that journal was doing, and also told of the activities of the Methodist book room.

Congratulations to King. Rev. J. C. Reid, Wallaceburg, presented the resolution having to do with the congratulations of the conference to King George on the occasion of the birthday. The draft was sent to the governor-general, the Duke of Connaught, who will send it to Buckingham Palace.

To Be Ordained. At the evening meeting of the conference four young men who will on Sunday be taken into the church as ordained ministers, made addresses. These were J. R. Peters, R. W. Risk, W. J. E. Jones and R. A. Brooks. Mr. Peters has really been ordained before, but has never been received into full connection. A public reception was held in the church by the conference members for the candidates, and their addresses were listened to with much interest by a great audience. Rev. J. G. Holmes, of Bridgeport, moved that the young men be taken into the church as full fledged preachers, and Rev. Wesley Coates, of London, seconded the motion. Both ministers made strong addresses. On Saturday there is much important business to come up.
