TAKES BLACK JAPAN DOSE BUT IS OUT OF DANGER

Mrs. Campbell, Clarence Street, Refuses to Give Reason For Act.

For reasons which she refused to divulge, Mrs. Campbell, a colored woman, of 252 1/2 Clarence street, took a large dose of black Japan Monday afternoon, and as a consequence was rushed to Victoria Hospital in a dangerous condition. The stomach-pump was applied and emetics administered, and at latest reports from the hospital she was out of danger. She would give no reason whatever for taking the liquid. But for the fact that she failed to take a sufficient quantity she would have succumbed from the effects of the dose, but it is regarded as fatal only in exceptionally large doses.

CANADA'S REASONS FOR THANKSGIVING

URGED BY PREACHERS

Union Services Held Monday in Two Churches.

BLESSINGS ENUMERATED

Allied Successes and Death of John Barleycorn Two Features.

Methodists from the various churches of that denomination in the city held an impressive union Thanksgiving service yesterday forenoon at 11 o'clock in the First Methodist Church, when Rev. Dr. H. S. Douglass of Askin Street, South London, was the preacher of the occasion.

Enumerating various reasons for thanksgiving at this time, even in the midst of the tragedy and sorrow of war, the speaker mentioned first the growing hopefulness of the outlook for the Allies.

"The ultimate victory of the Allies," he said, "is not a matter of question now, but a matter of time. It would not have been surprising if, in the first months of the war, when England was unprepared, we became faint-hearted. Those were terrible days of retreat from Mons, of the Russian retreat, of Belgium overrun, of the destruction of Serbia, of the disaster of Mesopotamia. Those days are gone, thank God. Slowly but surely they came together that mighty army of Kitcheners."

"Just here I would like to pause a moment or two to do honor to the great Britisher, the great soldier and the great hero, whose body is lying about somewhere in the billows, hurled by the hand of God."

Sorrow, But No Shame.

"It would not be fitting to pass on without reference as a cause for thanksgiving to the unswerving courage of our Canadian men, who have brought lustre to the name of Canada."

"We have tears for them on our cheeks, but no blush of shame. We have sorrow in our hearts, but no shame. Our men have lived like heroes, fought like giants and died like martyrs."

"After this war, hosts will turn to Canada, to the land from whence came, to fight for righteousness and liberty, the gallant Canadian men."

"We have another reason for rejoicing. In two-thirds of the area of the Dominion of Canada today, John Barleycorn is an outlaw. He cannot dare to show his hideous face. It hasn't so long ago that he was then a legal citizen, and could walk our streets without fear. He wasn't wont to show shame. Think of it! 'Whiskey Row' is no more in London! The prisons are losing their business, and one prison in Ontario has already discharged eight turnkeys."

"The day seems not far away when the traffic will disappear from Canada. But there must be watching and there must be prayer."

The Greatest Gift.

"Truly, we have much for which to be thankful. I mention the last and the greatest gift of all, the great gift of God's grace. 'For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given.' I have purposely left to the last this gift of all reasons for thanksgiving, God's gift to us of his son to be our Savior."

Rev. C. R. Flanders, D.D., pastor of the First Methodist Church, presided.

Rev. J. E. Holmes of the Ridout Street Methodist Church, chairman of the London district, assisting with the opening devotional exercises.

Singing was led by a male chorus, composed largely of the Methodist ministers of the city, under the direction of A. D. Jordan. A prominent visitor was Rev. Dr. D. L. McCrae, Rev. Dr. J. Knox, Rev. W. R. Macintosh, Rev. Dr. H. H. Knox, Rev. Mr. Lynd and Rev. J. James McKay.

Special music was provided by the school choir. Knox opened the service with prayer. The lessons were read by Dr. D. L. McCrae, and the closing prayer was made by Rev. Dr. C. MacGregor.

"We are living in an age of sacrifice, but the most pleasing sacrifice to God is thanksgiving. It is man's chief duty to glorify God," said Rev. James McKay, addressing the congregation from the text: "Whoso offereth sacrifice of thanksgiving, glorifieth me."

Continuing he showed that although war had cast a general gloom over the universe, much remained for which to give thanks. "The dark and troubled mantle now cast over the world is not a mantle of our own making," he said. "It was wrought by our enemies, and in time will come; not unto us, but unto them. Two dark years of war have passed, and the clouds have begun to show signs of giving way to a better, brighter recent victory."

Victory to the Right.

"Final victory will be long in coming, but it will be our victory, and we must not let the Kaiser say, God fights for the side of truth and liberty, and not with the murderers of innocent women and little children. Possibly the end is delayed that our enemies may become conscious of the wrong they have committed, and repent. Perhaps we are not yet ready for victory. We may have placed too much confidence in our navies and armies, and not enough in our God. But I think that gradually we are beginning to realize our dependence on him. We still live in a land of peace and plenty; the sorrows of war have touched us lightly compared to other lands. 'God is using this crisis as a means of stopping the world in its mad downward career. He is not only stopping it, he is calling: 'Right about face!' We must turn back."

ROOM FOR A FEW ADDITIONAL STUDENTS.

There is room for a few additional students in the women's and girls' evening and afternoon classes at the Technical School. A limited number of students may be admitted to the evening and afternoon classes, where women and girls may make their own garments and millinery under the expert instruction. The evening classes and the afternoon art classes will also accommodate a few more students, but as the accommodation of the school is limited applications will be admitted only until the present vacancies are filled. Practically all the men's and boys' classes are filled and waiting lists have been opened for a number of machine shop classes. There are still a few vacancies in joinery and carpentry, architectural drawing, building construction, plumbing, cabinet-making and sheet metal draughting. Students will be admitted any evening until the vacancies in these classes are filled.

Quotes Prohibition.

Mr. McKay cited as an instance of the temperance movement, and the new prohibition act. He characterized it as one of the greatest movements the world had so far known, and stated that he believed it would have such an effect that the day was not far distant when Christ should reign supreme.

He stated that there were other ways of giving thanks as well as by praying and attending church. "Thousands starve in Belgium," he said. "We can help. Our war hospitals are filled with men for whom we can work, and thousands more, who hold the trenches in France and Belgium, are in need of many comforts which are in our power to give them."

At home, scattered throughout the country are churches and missions, which, because they have given so many members for the cause, will be forced to close. "We can help these."

AT ST. MARKS.

The Thanksgiving services held in St. Marks Church were both largely attended, the edifice being crowded to the doors. Rev. Wm. Lewis, rector of Trinity Church, Lucan, who organized the congregation six years ago, preached two able sermons. Mrs. E. Cook and Miss Lillian Moss sang excellent solos. Mr. Christian led the choir. The thanksgiving amounted to over \$76.

REV. WILLIAM GODWIN DIES SUNDAY EVENING

Retired Methodist Pastor Passes Away After Long Illness.

The death of Rev. William Godwin, a retired Methodist minister, occurred Sunday evening at the family residence, 683 Maitland street.

He was well known in the city, and throughout Western Ontario, having occupied Methodist pulpits in the London Conference for thirty years.

He was pastor at different times at the Hamilton Road Methodist, the old Pall Mall (now known as the Colborne Street Methodist), and the Empress Avenue Methodist Churches.

In all his charges he won his way into the hearts of the members of his congregation, and only when forced by declining health did he relinquish his duties. He had been stationed at other appointments in the conference, at Kingsville, Exeter, Parkhill and Walkerville.

He was superannuated after leaving Parkhill eight years ago, and a few years ago moved to Sarnia, where his duties were light.

Six weeks ago he was forced to give up his work, and moved to the city, taking up his residence on Maitland street.

He is survived by a large family, consisting of the widow, four sons and four daughters.

The funeral services will be held on Wednesday at Kingsville, where interment will take place.

A private service will be held at the family residence this evening at 6:30, and the remains will be forwarded to Kingsville early Wednesday morning via L. and P. S. R. to St. Thomas, thence Pere Marquette to Kingsville.

MOTORCYCLE HITS AGED MAN, BREAKING HIS LEG

Rider Strikes Him When He Becomes Confused.

Fred Munney, an aged man of St. Thomas, had his leg broken when he was struck on Monday forenoon at 10:50 o'clock by a motorcycle ridden by Charles Allen, according to witnesses Munney became confused in crossing Dundas street at the corner of Talbot, and stepped directly in front of the machine.

The motorcycle was traveling only at a low rate of speed, and the driver, it is said, could not have possibly avoided the accident.

Munney was removed to Victoria Hospital in the police ambulance, where the fracture was reduced.

Mr. Allen was questioned by the police, but was not held.
