AT MONTREAL GARAGE

The east end garage caught fire this morning in some mysterious manner, and as a result over 200 cars, which were stored there, have been destroyed and the entire place is nearly in ruins. The fire started about 8 o'clock, with an explosion which blew the roof off the building, and a few minutes afterwards the entire building was in flames. A general alarm was turned in about 9, and the firemen began a fight to prevent a large gasoline tank buried beneath the building from exploding.

The water pressure, which was at first not very strong, increased later first not very strong, increased later on. The loss, it is stated, is considerable, as many of the cars stored in the garage were not insured.

Ayres With Five Passengers Dead.

Ayres With Five Passengers Dead.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 8.—The French steamer Malta, from Havre and Vigo, arrived here yesterday aftenoon with five passengers dead, seven dangerously ill and a large number of others suffering from attacks of influenza, which broke out in violent form a few days ago. The ship's doctor reported that he had daily attended 50 patients since the disease was first reported, and that the epidemic had continued to spread among the other passengers.

Dispatches in recent weeks have reported the reappearance of influenza in epidemic form in many parts of Spain, in varying degrees of intensity, A large number of deaths have been caused in Madrid by a double visitation of influenza and typhus, while Santandre, Valencia, Saragossa and other cities have been hard hit by influenza epidemics. No reports of the appearance of influenza at Vigo have been received, and this is also true of the French port of Havre.
