## SINN FEINERS WILL STILL INSIST ON IRISH INDEPENDENCE

Official Organ of the Dail Eireann Makes Official Declaration From Headquarters in Dublin-Valera Is Taking Up British Peace Proposals With Followers.

London, July 25 .- Nothing less than national independence will content the Sinn Fein leaders. The Irish Bulletin, official organ of the Daff Elreann, makes this declaration from the head-

makes this declaration from the head quarters in Dublin.

While nothing is actually known of the nature of the Government's proposals beyond the general outline of dominion home rule and fiscal autonomy, the Bulletin contains an outburst against the assumptions of the British press concerning the negotiations, which appears to show that the proposals are unsatisfactory so far as Southern Ireland is concerned.

Plan Reorganization.

According to Associated Press dispatches from Ireland, the Government proposals include a plan to reorganize the Irish police on a civil basis, eliminating the military element and dispanding the auxiliaries. This would be an important concession to Irish feeling.

The British cabinet council tonight decided to bring the session of Parliament to an end August 9, "unless an Irish settlement makes an autumn session necessary." The provisional decision is taken to mean that the Government is still hopeful of peace in Ireland. The day was without progress towards a solution, and the public was left to flounder in the realms of conjecture, for the prime minister was able only to promise the House of Commons a statement on the situation some time in the future, and to warn the House against reliance upon unofficial reports.

Complaints received from officers of the "Irish Republican army" regarding the violation of the truce conditions by British soldiers have not yet been fully considered; they are said to be of a rather technical nature.

CONSIDERING PLANS. CONSIDERING PLANS.
BELFAST, July 25.—Plans for the complete reconstruction of the Irish Police Force are under consideration by the Irish executive.
The points under discussion include the early disbandment of the auxillaries and the complete reorganization of the Royal Irish Constabulary, and the merging of the Dublin Metropolitan Police in a newly constituted force in which all the men now serving have the option of joining.

It is regarded as certain that the duxiliaries will be disbanded at an early date, but will be given the choice of joining the new organization, the same as other members of the force.

The Royal Irish Constabulary, being intimately interested in the proposed changes, recently organized a meeting of delegates of various ranks, including officers, at which definite proposals were formulated. These are to be submitted to the Irish executive tomorrow, when assurances will be asked from the Government of several points.

EXPRESS RESENTMENT.

DUBLIN, July 26.—The Irish Bulletin, the official organ of the Dail Eireann, dealing today with comments in the British press on the Irish negotiations, expresses resentment at hints that refusal to accept reasonable terms will result in a renewal of the terror and declares that Ireland has its own views and will accept nothing which is the negation of the right of self-determination. On the contrary, she will return to the wilderness rather than accept anything, compromising national honor and national independence.

Do Not Understand.

The Bulletin complains that British comment during the last ten days has falled completely to understand Ireland's ambitions or her determination to realize them. It says that they talk of "the liberal and generous concessions of dominion home rule with modifications and some even talk of revival of miltary terror unless we accept those concessions," which would be more accurately described as the negation of the right of self-determination which British statesmen, during the war, considered essential to world peace.
