IT WAS DISPLAY PEER GAMENESS TO HOLD TITLE

Western Hockey Still
Supreme in Gruelling
Series.

OUTSPEED ESKS

After Scoring Goal, Played De-
fence Style Which West-
erners Could Not Solve

Canadian Press Despatch.
Vancouver, April 1.—Ottawa Senators hold the world's championship. They fought their way through three play-offs to the honor, which they earned, if any team ever did. Defeating the Montreal Canadiens they came west and turned back the Vancouver Maroons, three games out of four. Saturday night the Senators defeated Edmonton Eskimos by the score of 1 to 0. The Senators got their lone score about half way through the first period, and from that point they played safe with an uninteresting defensive game, which the eastern team could not solve. The Eskimos are one of the fastest teams in major hockey, but their speed availed them nothing against the Senators.

The 7,000 fans, who turned out to see the final game, expressed their admiration for the fighting spirit which animated the Senators. At no time during the games with Vancouver or Edmonton were the easterners at their full strength. Gerard's appearance last night was made at the cost of much pain to himself because of his injured ankle. During the game he again received a severe wrench which forced him to retire. He was back into the fray in a few minutes.

Boucher also. George Boucher played the first part of the game despite a badly cut foot received in the first game. The Senators triumphed over the best the West has produced this season, and they have secured their victory. It was a battle of speed and brilliant attack against experience, a heady calculation in every play, and grim determination, and the latter won.

Last night's game was singularly clean throughout, although eight penalties were handed out by Referee Jones. All two-minute penalties were received four-minute penalties. One of Ottawa's penalties was given to Benedict. Clancy filled the breach and Edmonton failed to score.

The crowd was about evenly divided between their desire to see western team triumph and their admiration for the grit of the Senators. The work of Simpson, Trapp and Boucher on the defence was very fine. Last night's game Ottawa secured shots on Winkler in the first, second, and third periods. In the third, Edmonton sent in 23, 13 and 15 in the three periods. Keats scored somewhat disappointing on a series play, scoring the goal which put him, showing great speed, Gagne and Arbour proved themselves fast and tricky players.

There is no denying that Ottawa possesses a world champion and one worthy of the championship honor. He weighed the westerners, and he was not wrong. He played in the final game last night, however, very acceptably. Everyone was agreed on the opinion that the Senators played and won under very exceptional handicaps. They are a great team, one of the greatest ever seen in action in the west. Western teams undoubtedly could learn something from them in the matter of team work.

Individually the Vancouver team are quite as brilliant. But, welded into a whole and working as a team, the Senators are probably without peers in Canada today. The world's championship remains in worthy hands.

Inter-Club Winner To Enter O.A.B.A. Under L.A.A.

Senior Teams May Draft Players From Club And Failure To
Report Renders Player Ineligible—Season Opens
With Double-Header May 12.

The Inter-Club League decided at a meeting held over the week-end to accept the offer of the L.A.A. to send the winner into the further competition following the local season. The president, Bert Shaw, and the secretary, C. C. McDougall, were appointed to attend the meeting of the O.A.B.A. to be held in Toronto Saturday, April 7.

An amendment to the constitution was passed, providing that any player team from one of the Inter-Club nine must play senior, or, in event of failure to report, forfeits his rights to play in either organization. It was further agreed that a player would be classed as senior after having played three senior games.

After some discussion, the schedule for the season was adopted. It will not, however, given out for publication for a day or so. The games for the opening date, May 12, were announced as follows: At Queen's Park, Forest City vs. Alerts; at Sunshine Park, Hermitage vs. K. C. Orients are idle.

The matter of umpires and scorers came up, and some communications were read, but was finally left over for

Wednesday's meeting. A committee will take up the details of the agreement for the use of Sunshine Park with the authorities of the latter organization within the course of a few days.

Another meeting will be held Wednesday, April 4, when the entry fees for the clubs will be expected to be in and contract forms will be entered to the five teams.

The meeting drew representatives from all the clubs interested, and plenty of enthusiasm was shown. It was voiced by several present that the spirit of co-operation between the L.A.A. and the Inter-Club League, which was very much in evidence at the meeting, would have far-reaching and beneficial results.

F. Foots briefly thanked the delegates for their co-operation. Delegates to the meeting were: Alerts, Roy Baker, L. Dambra and J. Reid; Orients, Frank Tucker and W. Russ; Hermitage, Jack Greer; Forest City, Bob Rowan; K. C. of Ed Ryan and Ed Slattery.
