14 KILLED AS U.S. AIRSHIP FALLS

Mayor Scored For 'Slanderous Attack' On City's Railway

DIRIGIBLE BREAKS INTO THREE PARTS **DURING OHIO GALE**

Fourteen Killed When Giant Air Cruiser Shenandoah Is Destroyed -Was Travelling at Altitude of 3,000 Feet When Hit by Squall-Majority of Dead Are Found in Control Cabin of Wrecked Craft-Was On Tour of Western and Middle States.

HEROIC EFFORTS MADE TO SAVE SHIP

Caldwell, Ohio, Sept. 3.—The giant dirigible Shenaudoah of the United States navy is no more. It went down in three pieces early today and killed its commander, Lieutenant-Commander Zachary Lansdowne, and at least thirteen of the officers and men making up her crew.

The airship struck a line squall-a variety of storm most feared by airmen-shortly after 5 o'clock this morning near this Noble county village, while travelling at an altitude of 3,000 feet,

There was no explosion. The big ship simply met winds of a strength which it was unable to combat. After encountering the storm at the high altitude the ship headed heavenwards to an altitude of approximately 5,000 feet, when it suddenly came down again and broke into three pieces. One piece, 450 feet or more in length, fell in a field about 11/2 miles from Ava. The control compartment in which the commander and navigating erew were riding, fell 50 feet away, and the third section, 150 feet long, drifted Was the Only Strictly Military through the air like a free balloon for 12 miles, landing near



The property of the navy, it was equipped with machine guns and to be used for purposes of war, whereas its sister ship, the Los Angeles, was constructed in Germany and flown to the United States under an arrangement of the Versailles treaty, providing that it should be used only for non

military purposes.
