BULLER IS POPULAR.
May Blossom into a British Boulanger.

CHEERED IN THE THEATRE
And Mobbed by Cheering Crowds in the Streets—Sir Redvers Declares the National Review Telegram is Not His.

London, Oct. 31.—General Buller, speaking to-day to a reporter of the London Evening News, regarding the telegram to General White, attributed to him by the National Review, says:—"That is not my telegram."

General Buller threatens to blossom into a British Boulanger. He does not appear to court privacy or to discontinue demonstrations. He attended a theatre in London yesterday evening and when recognized was cheered. He rose to his feet and bowed his acknowledgment. Outside the building General Buller was mobbed by cheering crowds, and the police had to be called in to clear the streets.

There is no doubt that a large section of the troops is indignant at the general's dismissal. The decision to make a naval demonstration against Turkey was taken at a meeting of the cabinet Tuesday, at which Mr. Deleane, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, explained the Sultan's procrastination regarding the French demands.

Admiral Caillaud's squadron consists of the armored cruiser, Admiral Potemkin, Chazay and Latouche-Trille, the second-class cruisers Dr. Chayla and Cassard and the third-class cruiser Galilee. The crews aggregate 2,236 men, but the vessels will also carry landing parties.

The newspapers approve the Government's decision. The Journal des Debats says:—"Everyone at Constantinople and the other capitals must be aware that France and Russia are determined in accordance with the Sultan's procrastination regarding the French demands."

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FRANCE IS FIRM
In Her Determination to Bring Turkey to Terms

A NAVAL DEMONSTRATION
In Turkish Waters, to be Followed by a Bombardment or a Port if the Sultan Continues Stubborn—Paris Press Approves the Government's Decision—Late Last Night the Squadron Unexpectedly Returned to Toulon.

Paris, Oct. 31.—The officials of the French Foreign Office confirm the report that a division of the French Mediterranean fleet, composed of three battleships and two cruisers, under the command of Admiral Caillaud, has proceeded from Toulon to the Levant to make a naval demonstration against Turkey. A Foreign Office official, in communicating the foregoing to a press correspondent, said:—"The French fleet is a sealed order, and proceeds first to a Greek port, the island of Smyrna, I think—where the admiral will receive definite instructions as to carrying out his sealed orders. I am not at liberty to say what the sealed orders are, but the seizure of the customs at Smyrna would probably be a very effective way of convincing the Sultan that France's patience is exhausted, and that we have decided to enforce an immediate execution of the Turkish Government's engagements. We, however, are very hopeful that the Sultan will not resist to go to that extreme. Our squadron will not reach the Greek port before Sunday. The Turkish Government has thus still three days' grace, and we trust in the meantime to receive complete satisfaction. We have acted very considerably towards Turkey, hoping up to the last moment that she would carry out her engagements, and it is only now, when we found that there is no serious intention of her doing so, that we have reluctantly resolved to put stronger pressure to bear, in the shape of a naval demonstration. It is now two months since the French Ambassador, M. Constant, left Constantinople. His departure failed to produce the desired effect. On the contrary, even the quays and the Turkish authorities, the Sultan's aides purported to settle, remain open. The internal situation in the Turkish Empire deterred us for some time from taking drastic measures to enforce our demands, but the dignity of France could not permit the present state of affairs to be prolonged indefinitely. We sincerely hope the Sultan will fully appreciate the fact that we cannot any longer be trifled with, and relieve us of taking further steps to safeguard our interests."

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ed. When he came to Huron there was little cleared land, and he settled in the bush and did his full share towards converting the dense forests into fruitful farms. His power and gifts as an eloquent and fluent platform speaker brought him into prominence, and there are few constituents in the province that his voice has not been heard in, on the political platform or at farmers' institute meetings. He leaves a widow, two sons and one daughter.

CANADIAN SCOUTS
Capture Seventeen Boer Train Wreckers.

250 Boers Accounted for by the Recent British Successes—A Boer Spy Captured—A Telegraph Line Damaged.

Pretoria, Oct. 31.—The successes of the past four days have accounted for 250 Boers. The capture of seventeen train wreckers by Gen. Williams' column was effected chiefly by Major Ross and the Canadian Scouts, who marked down the party over night, and captured some of them at the first surprise. Others were chased for many miles until they were caught. A large quantity of dynamite was found in possession of the prisoners.

A BOER SPY CAPTURED.
Cape Town, Oct. 31.—A Boer spy was discovered yesterday travelling on a train from Stormberg to Burgersdorp. He wore the uniform of Remington's Guides.

TELEGRAPH LINE DAMAGED.
A portion of the telegraph line from Cape Town to Port Elizabeth, via George, Avontuur and Humansdorp, has been damaged by the Boers.

ARMENIAN REFUGEES.
Those in Russia Must Become Russian Subjects or Quit the Country.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.—The Russian Government, according to the Transcaucasus correspondent of the Novoye Vremya, has decided what shall be done with the 40,000 Armenian fugitives who have been gathering in the Transcaucasus districts of Russia since 1893. Those who desire may return to Turkey at their own expense. Those electing to remain in Russia may seek admission into a peasant commune. If some remain whom the communes refuse to admit, they must apply for admission into a locality organization of Mechanics or ordinary unprivileged subjects. By 1903 all must be Russian subjects or quit the Empire. Those who remain in Russia must be prepared to accept the Russian language, not enjoy the privileges granted to earlier arrivals, but must be deported. Twenty years after becoming subjects of the Czar, the Armenians may acquire land.

A FOUL MURDER.
Two Men and a Woman Arrested Charged with the Crime.

Bangor, Me., Oct. 31.—Thomas Gibbons, of Bangor, foreman for a lumber concern, and Mrs. A. Holt, of Augusta, and Mrs. Gero are under arrest for the alleged murder of Thos. Gero, at Chesuncook, news of which was received last night. J. E. Hartshorn, of St. Johnbury, Vt., a hunter, brought the story. He said that on Tuesday forenoon the people at the Chesuncook Hotel going across the lake near the Gero House, saw the body of Thos. Gero stretched on the ground, partially covered by a cloth, but terribly mangled. There were no less than 17 cuts on the corpse, and from its appearance it was evident that a fierce fight had occurred before he had given up his life. The wounds appeared to have been made with a knife or a razor, save one in the side, which seemed to have been made with an axe. According to Mr. Hartshorn's information, Mrs. Gero and a man whom nobody seems to know were considerably the worse for liquor. Mr. Barnes, a justice of the peace, who lives near by, was notified, and the strange man, who gave his name as Fred. Holt, and Thomas Gibbons, who were staying at the Gero House, were arrested together with Mrs. Gero.

HIS MAJESTY IS WELL.
Scare Reports Were all Manufactured—There Was No Operation.

London, Oct. 31.—The Lancet to-day says it has official authority to announce that the recent rumors regarding the health of King Edward were entirely without truth or foundation, and that he is in good health, and has undergone no operation whatever.

MISS STONE ALIVE.
U. S. State Department Convinced of It, AND SANGUINE OF THE OUTCOME.

Mme. Tsilka and Child Again Reported Dead—The Porte Repudiates Responsibility for the Abduction and Will Resist Repayment of the Ransom.

Constantinople, Oct. 31.—It is again rumored that Mme. Tsilka, the companion of Miss Stone, and her child (born since her capture by the brigands) are dead.

SATISFACTORY PROGRESS.
Constantinople, Oct. 30.—The negotiations for the ransom of Miss Ellen Stone, the abducted American missionary, are progressing satisfactorily. It is understood, but beyond this nothing having them in hand maintain elaborate secrecy as they are convinced that publicity would be detrimental to Miss Stone's interests and safety.

THE PORTE REPUDIATES RESPONSIBILITY.
Constantinople, Oct. 31.—The Turkish Government is already endeavoring to resist the anticipated demand of the United States for repayment of the ransom necessary to secure the release of Miss Ellen Stone, the abducted American missionary. The Porte repudiates all responsibility for the kidnapping of Miss Stone, and that therefore the latter is justified in refusing to recoup the United States for the money expended in her rescue.

MISS STONE IS ALIVE.
Washington, Oct. 31.—Referring to the opinion expressed yesterday in some of the Russian publications, to the effect that Miss Stone was probably dead, it may be stated that the State Department is convinced to the contrary. The department is in almost hourly communication with its agents in Turkey and Bulgaria. The latest advices indicate that communication has been established with the brigands themselves. The department officials are sanguine of the outcome.

QUEBEC BY-ELECTIONS.
Result of the Contests for the Legislature in Vaudeville, Quebec County, and Drummond.

Vaudeville, Que., Oct. 31.—The election for Legislature for Vaudeville county resulted in the election of Dr. Plon, Liberal. He has sixty majority, with one poll to hear from, in which it is likely his majority will be increased.

Quebec, Oct. 31.—Returns for Quebec county by-election to-day.—De-lage, Liberal, 206 majority, with several polls to hear from.

Drummondville, Que., Oct. 31.—The by-election to fill the seat in the Legislature for Drummondville made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Watts, took place to-day, and resulted in the return of J. L. Ferry, Government candidate, by a majority of 775, with two polls yet to be heard from.

SMALL-POX RESTRICTIONS.
Northern Ontario Lumbermen not Complying with Regulations.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—Dr. P. H. Byrce, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, states that some of the lumber manufacturers in Northern Ontario are not complying with the regulations regarding the precautions to be taken against small-pox. Those who are living up to the law find themselves seriously handicapped by the negligent ones. The laborers, who are scarce at the present time, prefer to make for where there are fewer restrictions upon them.
