PONSIBILITY.

Constantinople, Oct. 31.-The Turkish Government is already preparing to resist the anticipated demand of the United States for repayment of the ransom necessary to secure the release of Miss Ellen M. Porte repudiates all responsibility for the kidnapping of Miss Stone, and maintains that the United States has no claim against Turkey, and that therefore the latter is justified in refusing to recoup the United States for the money expended in her rescue A high Turkish official this morning informed a press representative that the Turkish resistance of any claims would be based upon these contentions:-First, that Miss Stone, alescort, which precaution even the foreign consuls always take when travtricts of the Empire, and third, that the brigands who kidnapped Miss Stone and her companion were Bulgarians; that the coup was planned in Bulgaria, and that sanctuary was

found in Bulgarian territory. MISS STONE IS ALIVE. Washington, Oct. 31.-Referring to the opinion expressed yesterday some of the Russian publications, to the effect that Miss Stone was probably dead, it may be stated that the State Department is convinced to the contrary. The department is in almost hourly communication with its agents in Turkey and Bulgaria. The latest advices indicate that communication has been established with the brigands

themselves. The department officials are sanguine of the outcome. SOFIA AMERICANS CONFIDENT. New York, Oct. 31.-Americans are preparing a reception for Miss Stone upon her release, says a Sofia, Bulgaria, correspondent of the Journal and Advertiser. It is believed that Miss Stone will be able to be present at Philippopolis on Nov. 8, at the dedication of the new American church there. After that she will doubtless go to the
