FORTY-FIFTH YEAR

Four Persons are Killed and Twenty-Three Others Receive injury.

Members of the Train Crew are Put Under Arrest Pending

Chicago, Aug. 17.—Four persons were killed, another fatally injured and 23 slightly injured in a collision this afternoon between an express trian on the Chicago Great Western railway and a train of three trolley cars bound for the Hawthorn race track. The train was coming into the city, and, according to some witnesses, was running at a high rate of speed.

The trolley train approached the crossing at a rapid rate, just as the train came around a sharp curve. The motor car struck the train between the ergine and tender. The motor car was torn to splinters. The car behind turned over, smashed nearly to pieces and dragged along the track for 100 feet. (The third car was not dragged from the track, and but for the fact that the couplings between it and the second trailer broke, the list of the injured probably would be larger, as all of the cars were filled with passengers.

Motorman Ryan remained at his post and was fatally hurt. To those who came to aid him while he lay on the ground he said: "The brakes would not work; that's what caused it.
