WAS ASSOCIATE OF LATE MEMBER

Resident of Hopewell Hill Pays Tribute to Late Archibald MacKenzie.

Hopewell Hill, Feb. 7.—The news in the press this week of the death at his home in Campbellton of Archibald MacKenzie, an old-day legislator and a former member of the House of Assembly, brought sincere regret and was of special interest to a resident of this place who was a particular friend of the late member and sat with him in the local House during the sessions of 1874-1878. This resident is Alexander Rogers, registrar of deeds, who represented Albert county in the Assembly during the term mentioned. When the late Mr. MacKenzie was the popular representative of Restigouche, Mr. Rogers was probably now the only surviving member of that House of nearly half a century ago. The late Hon. George E. King was then Premier; Hon. J. J. Fraser, provincial secretary, and Hon. William Wedderburn, Speaker. Mr. Rogers and the late Mr. MacKenzie were closely associated in their legislative duties and occupied the same lodgings during the sessions. In expressing sorrow at the death of his old associate, Mr. Rogers today paid high tribute to the late Mr. MacKenzie's sterling qualities of heart and life and general kindness of disposition that had not failed to give him friends on all sides during his life-time and would call forth sincere regret at his passing.

COUNTY'S OLDEST RESIDENT DEAD

Mr. John Fauda, 100 Years Old, Died, in Bed At River Charles Last Week.

Mrs. Elizabeth Buchanan, who is believed to have been the oldest woman resident of Restigouche county, died at the home of her daughter Mrs. John Fauda at River Charles on Wednesday February the 7th inst.

The late Mrs. Buchanan, who was formerly Miss Elizabeth Peters of Canobie, Gloucester Co., was born at that place in 1824 and was thus in her 100th year. She was predeceased by her husband some 35 years ago. From Canobie she moved to Black Point about 40 years ago where she lived until last March when her home was destroyed by fire. Since that time she had been living at River Charles with her daughter Mrs. John Fauda. Mrs. Buchanan's death was doubtless due to old age but the loss of her home a year ago and exposure suffered at that time constituted an experience from which the aged lady never recovered.

Deceased leaves to mourn three sons one daughter and ten grand children. The sons are George of Campbellton, Robert of Manchester, N. H., and Lincoln at home. Mrs. Fauda of River Charles is the only surviving daughter. The funeral services were held on Friday the deceased daughter and two grandchildren being present for the burial. Interment was made in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Clifton Gloucester County.
