The extension of the C. P. R. and G. T. R. eastward to Halifax were referred to as a leading feature of that enterprising policy which had resulted in prosperity and happiness to the people. The address concluded with a renewed expression of confidence in Sir John as a leader, and in his government as the

guide of the country's desires. Sir John replied at greater length than had been expected. He was cheered again and again. Sir John looks as hearty as he did when last in Halifax years before. His speech was a comprehensive review of the work of the conservative party and a patriotic outlook for the Dominion, not as independent of Britain's flag, but as independent of adverse legislation at Washington. He said that a year ago the Liberals were calling out that parliament should be dissolved, while now they were louder in their fears that this should happen. He would relieve his own conscience and calm their fears by telling them there would be no dissolution this year nor perhaps the next year.
