Asked Much, Got Little. On the 18th of February last Mrs. Mary Jenkins, a widow, 48 years of age, residing at 233 Huron-street, fell on an icy side walk in University-street and was severely injured. She estimated her damages at \$10,000. Fifteen witnesses were put in the box by the plaintiff. The defence went five better. The services of an Italian interpreter were required, as several of the witnesses came from Sunny Italy. The jury were out but a short time before returning a verdict for the city.

"A Disgrace to the Gown." Miss Louisa A. Garfield, who up to May last ran in conjunction with her husband a grocery store at 504 Queen west, claims from the city the sum of \$500. Her cellar in which she stored her goods was connected with the main sewer by means of a culvert. On June 19 last year there was a heavy rainfall and the sewer becoming choked the water and filth was conveyed, she claims, into her cellar. The city do not deny that the rain fell, but contend that the plaintiff was negligent in not providing a drain with a trap, as the unusually heavy rainfall was unforeseen. The case was a very dry one as far as the people in the court room was concerned, but it was the vehicle by which Mr. Reeve, Q.C., who appeared for the plaintiff, and City Solicitor Biggar had quite a lively little spat. Mr. Reeve was questioning the plaintiff for the enlightenment of the jury, but his questions were, so Mr. Biggar thought, misleading, and he accordingly rose and said to Lawyer Reeve: "The way in which you are putting the questions to witness is a disgrace to the gown you wear." Mr. Reeve grew quite indignant, but when Justice Street concurred with Mr. Biggar he subsided.




