DIED TO SAVE BER CHILDREN How Mrs. Barker of Hochelaga Perished

Winnipeg, June 14.—The saddest case in connection with the Mattawa Creek accident was that of Mrs. Baker of Hochelaga, who, with four children, ranging in age from 2½ years to 11, was on her way to visit friends at Elkhorn, Man.

She was in the colonist car, which was behind the mail car and which tumbled into the river.
