Totems, pipes, tubes, clay vessels, stone idols, etc., fill the shelves and cases. One stone idol is over two feet high, others in human and animal form are nearly as large. Fur carved in stone is over a foot long and weighs 30 or 40 pounds. One beautiful clay bowl is 18 inches across and shows the work of savage hands. Mexico, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Arkansas, Indiana, Mississippi, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, and other states are represented, as well as our own country, from the Pacific to the Atlantic. Many of the specimens are from England, Scotland, Ireland, France, S. America and New Zealand, showing the work of savage hands.
