

BROOKE COUNCIL.

Alvinston, Jan. 10, 1916. Council elect for the township of Brooke for the year 1916 met in Code's Hall, in the Village of Alvinston, at the hour appointed by statute.

Present: Wm. Annett, Reeve; Deputy Reeve being unwell was not present; D. Campbell; Hugh Kennedy and W. J. Johnston, Councillors.

Declarations of qualifications and office were taken before clerk, who stated the council was ready for business.

Engineer's report on the repair to the Zavitz-Ainsley drain read, estimated cost \$1300.

Campbell—Kennedy, that engineer's report on the repair to Zavitz-Ainsley drain be adopted and by-law be prepared authorizing work and loan.—Carried.

Communication received from solicitor in behalf of Wm. Gunn claiming water was brought by the construction of a drain and had not been carried to a sufficient outlet and causing damages to his lands.

Kennedy—Johnston, that council as a body visit and inspect the complaint mentioned, and clerk to notify his solicitor to that effect.—Carried.

Kennedy—Johnston, that the sum of \$5.00 each be granted in aid of the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, and the Children's Aid Society of the County of Lambton.—Carried.

Johnston—Campbell, that clerk be re-appointed at a salary of \$250 per annum with \$30 allowed for postage and other usual allowances.—Carried.

Johnston—Campbell, that James F. McNally be appointed assessor at a salary of \$85.00 and \$7.50 be allowed for postage.—Carried.

Johnston—Kennedy, that Paul Kingston be appointed collector to collect all rates at a salary of \$95.00 with \$7.50 for postage.—Carried.

Campbell—Johnston, that Dr. C. L. Taylor be appointed Medical Officer of Health and Dr. McLean a member of board.—Carried.

Kennedy—Campbell, that John Cowan, K.C., Sarnia, be reappointed as Township Solicitor at a retaining fee of \$300.—Carried.

Mr. T. H. Myers, treasurer of the township of Brooke, handed in his resignation to take effect about the 15th Jan.—Carried.

Johnston—Kennedy, that the resignation of T. H. Myers be accepted and Walter Annett be appointed Treasurer at a salary of \$140. per annum and postage allowed.—Carried.

Kennedy—Johnston, that George R. Shirley and Gordon Oakes be appointed auditors at a salary of \$20.00 each.—Carried.

Letter from A. S. Code, O.L.S., applying for the engineering work of the township. Campbell—Johnston, that engineering work be left with Geo. A. McCubbin, O.L.S. & C. E. Chatham, and clerk prepare by-law authorizing foregoing appointments.—Carried.

Kennedy—Johnston, that order be drawn on treasurer in favor of Municipal World for the sum of \$5.00 for six copies of paper for use of council.—Carried.

Johnston—Campbell, that township printing be given to Alvinston Free Press at \$150 per annum and drainage by-laws at \$1.50 per page. Salary to be paid quarterly.—Carried.

Johnston—Campbell, that the deposits and accounts of the township be continued in the Molsens Bank, Alvinston, on the same conditions as in 1915.—Carried.
