To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of the County of Annapolis.
We the Auditor, appointed at your annual meeting, in January, 1884; beg leave to report that during the year ending on the 31st of December, 1884, we have performed the duties assigned to us.
We have thoroughly examined the Treasurer's books and accounts for 1884, and carefully checked the vouchers produced therefor and find the same to be correct, and showing a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, at 31st December, 1884, of \$2,467.17, as per enclosed statement marked "C."
We find the large sum of \$1,091.80 either not collected or in the hands of the collectors of Wards 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, as will appear by statement hereunto annexed, marked "D," which statement also shows a reduction in the rate of Wards 2, 3, 4, 12 and 13, authorized by the Clerk and amounting to \$1,067.77.
In consequence of the above we find the balance paid during the year were for Wards 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, in all \$70, as will appear by statement hereunto annexed, marked "E," and the Municipal property referring to the expenditure of the Road and Bridge service monies calls for an account of same from each Councilor to be submitted to the Auditor. This has not been complied with.
We beg to call attention to the small amount paid in for fines during the year, and we recommend that steps be taken to ascertain if any monies for fines remain in the hands of justices throughout the County and enforce immediate payment of the same to the County Treasurer.
We would recommend that a change be made in the keeping of the accounts of the Treasurer and a system adopted, whereby each year's transaction may be kept separate and distinct, and not as presently merged from year to year to the next, and so on from year to year.
