RENEWED CONDEMNATION.

IMPORTANT PAPAL LETTER

An Earnest Appeal by the Holy Father to Protestants.

The following is the full text of the Pope's Apostolic Letter on the validity of Anglican Orders:

LET. Bishop, Servant of the Bervants of God, in perpetual remembrance.

We have dedicated to the welfare of the noble English nation no small portion of the Apostolic care and charity...

REASONS FOR OPENING THE QUESTION.

With the same mind and intention we have now determined to turn our consideration to a matter of no less importance which is closely connected with the same subject and with our desires...

PRESCRIBED METHOD OF EXAMINATION.
