This volume, the direct continuation of Vol. I., treats of the Viscera and the Heart. The selection and reproduction of dissections are identical with the methods employed in the first volume. Topographic anatomy has been especially considered. Practically all the illustrations are original, and especially prepared by most artistic methods, and reproduced in the most satisfactory and careful manner. The text descriptions are particularly clear and lucid and the terminology is made especially distinct by the use of italies and face type. This work should be of very great value to all interested in the subject of anatomy, and particularly, of course, to the medical student.
