Waste not thy being; back to Him Who freely gave it, freely give; Else is that being but a dream: 'Tis but to be, and not to live.

Be wise and use thy wisdom well;
Who wisely speaks, must live it too;
He is the wisest who can tell
How first he lived, then spoke, the true.

Be what thou seemest! live thy creed!
Hold up to earth the torch divine:
Be what thou prayest to be made;
Let the great Master's steps be thine.

Fill up each hour with what will last;
Buy up the moments as they go;
The life above, when this is past,
Is the ripe fruit of life below.

Sow truth, if thou the true would'st reap; Who sows the false shall reap the vain; Erect and sound thy conscience keep; From hollow words and deeds refrain.
