BRISK SALE OF HORSES AT THE REPOSITORY

Nearly a Hundred of the R. Simpson Co. Disposed of—Big Crowd—Good Prices.

The auction sale at the Repository yesterday presented a specially animated scene, when 250 horses were offered at auction before one of the biggest crowds on record. The buyers and salesmen were crowded by a thoroughly businesslike audience, who retained their interest from 11 o'clock until 7 p.m.

Mr. C. A. Burns, the proprietor, conducted the major part of the sale, and gave one of his very best exhibitions of ability as an auctioneer, conducting every individual sale to the full satisfaction of every buyer and bidder in the place.

The sale commenced with the unreserved disposal of 94 horses of the Robt. Simpson Company. These were in great demand and every one was sold as it came out. Mr. Delaney, the company's manager, was present during the sale and his representative, The De Laplante and Lumber Company had a special sale of about thirty heavy draft horses, which were sold at from \$180 to \$425, the best heavy team being sold for \$425 per team.

Used from \$35 to \$114.50, according to condition. Amongst the numerous buyers were Dr. Young, Subury, who bought a full carload of workers and general purpose horses, with a few nice drivers, at prices ranging from \$250, and shipped out at once. W. Sparrow, Melfort, Sask., who also bought a very useful carload of the same kind, at somewhat similar figures. The Coleman Baking Co. bought nearly twenty delivery horses, and found the Simpson Company's stock very much to their liking. Smith & Ryan, city, bought a number of them from \$380 to \$400 per pair. A. M. Williams, Bowmanville, bought a pair of heavy draft horses, \$420; J. J. Davis, Thorold, pair heavy draft horses, \$225; M. Moses, Lemonville, chestnut mare, \$197.50; A. WINDSOR OPENS GRAND CIRCUIT

Stewards in Session at New York Announce the Dates For the Meeting.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 14.—Stewards of the Grand Circuit met here today, announced dates for meets of the circuit in the different cities, admitted New York and Windsor, Ont., to the circuit, and adopted a rule providing that if a horse wins three stake races amounting to \$15,000 it must afterwards compete in a class to which it is eligible by the lowest record it has made in any one of its winning races.

Applications for admission to the circuit were presented to the stewards by Windsor, Ont., and Springfield, Ill. New York was admitted after Readville, Mass., already in the circuit, announced that it would surrender its dates to New York. Windsor was given the opening week of the circuit and Poughkeepsie and Springfield were refused.

The rule, providing that the horse winning \$15,000 in three stake races must compete in the class in which it has made its lowest record does not refer to futurities for three-year-olds and under. The stewards considered the "three-heat system" of races. While this system was not adopted, it was recommended to all clubs in the Grand Circuit. Under the "three-heat system" each heat
