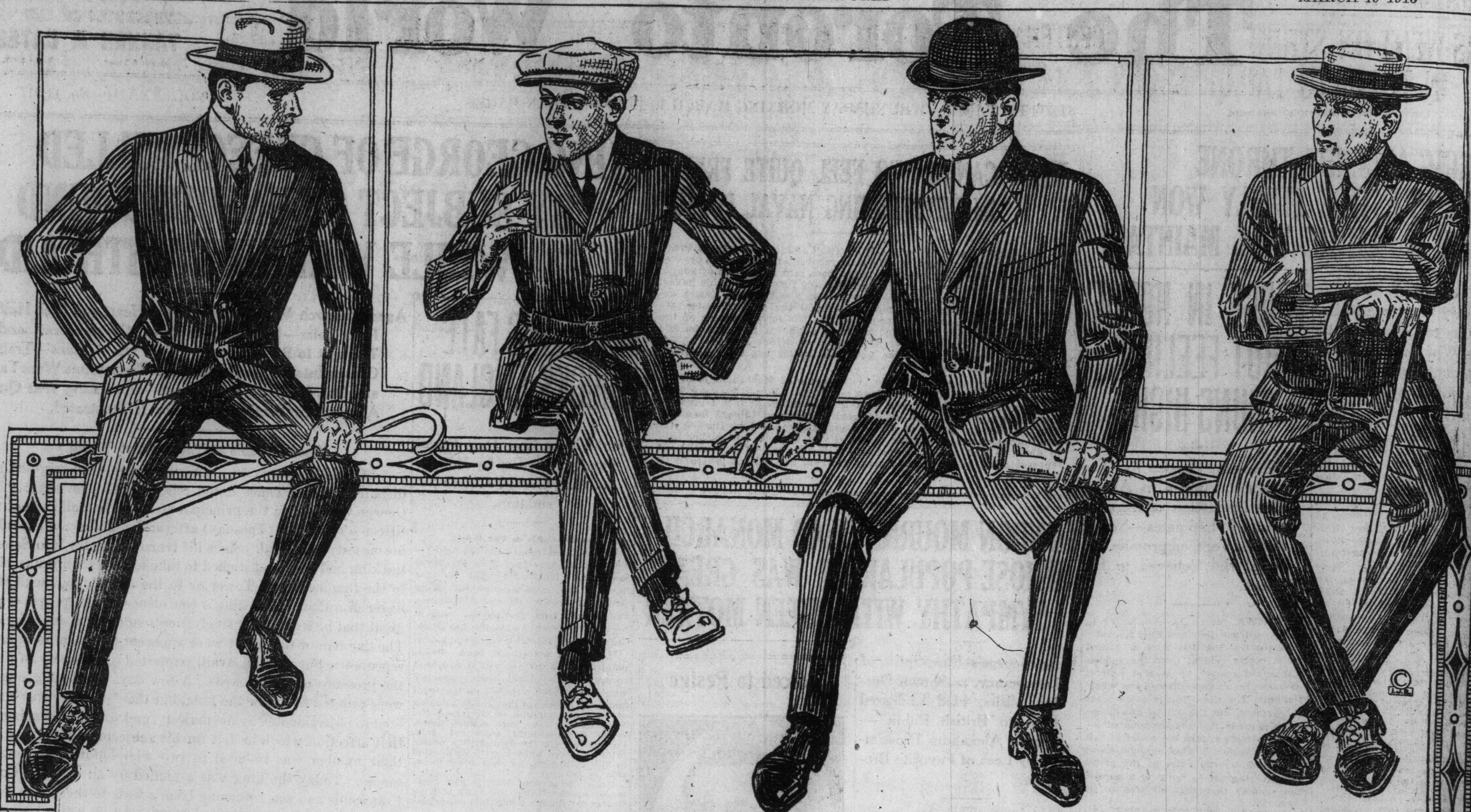

TORY GRADUATES ENDORSE BORDEN

Largely Signed Memoranda Will Be Sent to the Premier

ON NAVAL SITUATION

Noble and Unselfish Stand is Appreciated and Confirmed.

Conservative members of the graduating class, 1913, of the Law School of Osgoode Hall have come back in answer to the Liberal members of the same class in a petition, which is being largely signed, to be forwarded to Right Hon. R. L. Borden, endorsing the government's stand on the navy bill. Already a large number of signatures have been attached to the memoranda, which will be sent to Mr. Borden without delay. It follows: To the Right Hon. Laird Borden,

Premier of Canada. We the undersigned, the members of the graduating class, 1913, of the Law School of Osgoode Hall, Toronto, Ont., hereby express our sincere appreciation of and confirm the noble and unselfish stand taken by you on the naval question now before the house of commons.

We realize the deep debt of gratitude under which Canada and the Canadian people are bound to the mother country, and we are happy to see that the Conservative party, in accordance with its usual high ideals, supports that policy which will relieve the mother country in the face of the present emergency, and at the same time best safeguard the interests of Canada and the Canadian people.

We realize also that the British flag must remain supreme throughout the high and lofty position which is held by us as a great nation, and which we as true Canadian and loyal British subjects will strive to maintain. Wishing your success, we conclude in the words of that great Canadian statesman, Sir John A. Macdonald: "British subjects we were born and British subjects we will die."
