## CLUB WINS APPEAL ON AWARD

Arbitrator's Estimate of Dam-  
age More Than Doubled  
by Court.

## JUDGMENTS ANNOUNCED

Three Appeals Allowed and  
Eleven Dismissed at Os-  
goode Hall.

When judgments were handed out

at Osgoode Hall yesterday and dealt

with many cases which long had been

standing. Eleven of the cases were

dismissed while three were allowed.

In the case of the Brantford Golf Links

and County Club Mr. Justice Hodgins

made a large increase in the award

U.S. INVESTIGATES

NORTH SEA MINES

Government Seeks to Discov-

er Who is Responsible for

Operations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—An effort

is being made by the United States

Government to ascertain officially who

is responsible for the placing of the

mines in the North Sea. This is one

result of representations made to the

state department by the governments

of Denmark, Holland, Sweden and

Norway that their maritime commerce

with the United States had been par-

alyzed by the placing of mines outside

of territorial waters in violation of

The Hague treaties.

The United States was asked to join

with these governments in an effort

to have the warring European powers

abate the danger to navigation.

Whether it will do so or not is still

under consideration, but meanwhile

the inquiry is being made to deter-

mine the responsibility for the mine lay-

ing to what governments any repre-

sentations on the subject should be

addressed.

## CANNOT GET STEAMER TO CARRY VEGETABLES

Supplies at Montreal Intended for

Belgians Will Be Sold.

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—Inability to

secure a steamer to transport the sup-

plies on hand, as well as the large

quantity of wheat which is to be pur-

chased for the Belgian soldiers, has

led to the Belgian Relief Fund commit-

tee to decide on selling the vegetables in

order to save the loss on them. There

are over 500 bags of potatoes, besides

large quantities of other vegetables

which will be disposed of by a

leading Montreal commission house at

a specially low rate of commission.

Five large storage houses are being

used by the committee and these will

soon be filled. Advances were received

today that a carload of donations is

on the way from Belgium. Sales in

money for the Belgians also continue

to pour in.

NO EPIDEMIC AMONG

PRISONERS IN BRITAIN

Only Five Interned Germans Have

Died, is Official Announce-

ment.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—10 p.m.—In re-

sponse to the charge made by the Fran-

coeur Zeitung that the British Govern-

ment had died in England from

pneumonia and typhoid fever, it is of-

ficially stated that there have been

only five deaths among the prisoners.

One death was accidental and the

others were due to natural causes. The

statement says there has been no ty-

phoid or pneumonia.
