WILL COST MORE TO OIL STREETS

Price is Up Two Cents a Gallon, an Increase of 50 Per Cent.—Change in Metered Water Rates.

Residual oil for use in oiling the city's streets will cost two cents a gallon more this year than last year, according to the announcement made by Property Commissioner Harris, who told the works committee yesterday afternoon that this was directly traceable to the recent dissolution of the Standard Oil Co. Last year the city paid four cents a gallon and now the price has gone up to six cents. At this rate it will cost the city \$3,000 to oil the streets this year if 500,000 gallons are used, as was contemplated. The appropriation was \$24,000. Mr. Harris, however, stated that the increased demand for this commodity had a great deal to do with the rise in price.

Ald. McBride advocated that the city could devise some plan of rebuilding and rearranging Erie terrace, which he claimed was a disgrace to the city. He contended that all the property on this street, from Queen-street north should be expropriated and the whole replanned. This assessment commissioner and the city engineer were asked for a report upon the matter.

The report of the special committee on water rates, which proposed that the charges for metered water should be eight cents per thousand gallons for the first million used and six cents for every thousand gallons used thereafter, was adopted. Ald. Maguire, the chairman of the special committee, claimed that the manufacturers were satisfied with these rates as a temporary arrangement.

Assistant Assessment Commissioner Lyon stated that the estimates in connection with the extension and widening of Teraulay-street might be ready for the next meeting of the committee. The question of opening a street from the north end of O'Hara-avenue to West Lodge-avenue and from the latter street to Lansdowne-avenue was referred to the officials for a report.

A Dangerous Crossing.
A deputation of residents of Woodbine-avenue asked that something be done to make the crossing over the G. T.R. tracks on that street less dangerous.

The acting city engineer suggested that application be made to have an electric bell installed there, but the committee thought that gates would prove a more adequate protection, and Mr. Powell was instructed to submit a report upon this scheme.

In order to inspect municipal abattoirs in different American cities, Dr. Hastings, the medical health officer, will shortly make a tour in the United States, accompanied by the new property commissioner, who that official is appointed. The doctor is firmly convinced that Toronto needs such an establishment and he contends that the idea would work just as successfully here as across the line.

Parks Commissioner Chambers stated yesterday that he would require one more full day's work to complete the tennis courts of the city is constructing at the corner of Roncesvalles and Wright-avenue. Work would have been finished before this but for the wet weather. When the courts are ready the board of control will likely make provision for their use.

FEZ BELEAGUERED BY MOORS.
PARIS, May 31.—(Can. Press.)—A special despatch received here from Fez dated to-day, says that the investment of the city by the Moors is drawing closer, but that the defense of the capital is assured. The French column is preparing to take the offensive against the Moors. The despatch adds that two assaults on Sefrou by the Moors were successful, fully resisted Thursday with heavy losses to the enemy.
